Public sentiment needs stirring up in Newberg relative to observing some poorly kept city ordinances. A crusade looking toward the enforcement of the Sunday closing law is about the first thing in order.

Philippine Letter.

(Letter from Ethel Taylor McKillop Lucena, P. I.)

Lucena, Tayabas, P. I.
February 19th—My letter is two days overdue this time but we have been so rushed that neither one of us has had time to more than think of the home letters. The pupils discovered that yesterday was my birthday and so gave me what they call an assault or surprise party. They call it a surprise but yet we were told of their coming, so that we would have refreshments. As our house is rather small they told us we need not expect more than thirty. As a matter of fact over sixty were present. We prepared for them by cleaning out the bedroom, our largest room, and relieving the bareness of the walls by putting up some pretty mats and pictures. With the blooming orchids suspended from the tops of the open windows the effect was not so bad.

At about half past eight the music sounded under the window and the party came in. I think they all enjoyed themselves and I am sure we did. Not many beside pupils were present. The Governor and doctor and provincial secretary honored us with their presence. I want to send a copy of some birthday greetings one of my pupils sent me. He is a bright boy and ordinarily writes well, but he was making a special effort here so the result is rather comical.

Greeting and Congratulations.
'Twas midnight when I woke (February 17, 1907)
Roused by a frightful but joyous nightmare

And what I dreamed it was
That (this) it was your birthday eve
Happy was I in the morning (February 18, 1907)

February 20th—The fates seem to be against me getting this letter written. I thought I would finish it yesterday at school but did not and a bad cold kept me in bed all afternoon. Last evening, in spite of my cold, we were obliged to attend a reception given to Lieutenant Butler and bride. The latter came all the way from Fenton, New Jersey, to marry him. We like him very much. We just met his bride last night and first impressions were not very favorable. She seemed to be very affected and quite a coquette. Perhaps appearances are deceitful, however, and we may like her very much when we are acquainted.

School is going on in the usual trend. We are all getting a little tired and are quite ready for the vacation which soon comes. The hot season is gradually coming in. The days are noticeably warmer than a month ago. We are to have a holiday on Friday, Washington's birthday, it being the last one until Easter. School will have to close two days earlier than intended because Easter comes so early. The people have already begun their chants.

February 23—I wish you might see my pretty orchids. They are in full bloom now, one basket has eight clusters on it, each cluster containing from five to ten flowers. The color is a waxy white with a few red and yellow stripes in the center. We suspend them from the tops of the windows as they are air plants.

We heard only last week that all the examinations in the Philippine public schools were to be uniform and to be issued from Manila. It comes as a complete surprise and is causing much excitement among the pupils. They have cause to fear, the scarcity of text books of a kind makes it very probable that they will be examined over some things they have not studied. The examinations come March 20, 21 and 22, and school closes March 27.
