Cash, pastor of the Friends church here, who preached a searching and impressive sermon to the attentive audience. Mr. Cone was a Mason and Mr. Vaughan an Odd Fellow, the respective orders taking charge of the services at the cemetery. Twenty-one Masons of this place attended the funeral, making the trip by river in the steam launch. Both Cone and Vaughan were well known Oregon pioneers, having crossed the plains in the same year, 1852.

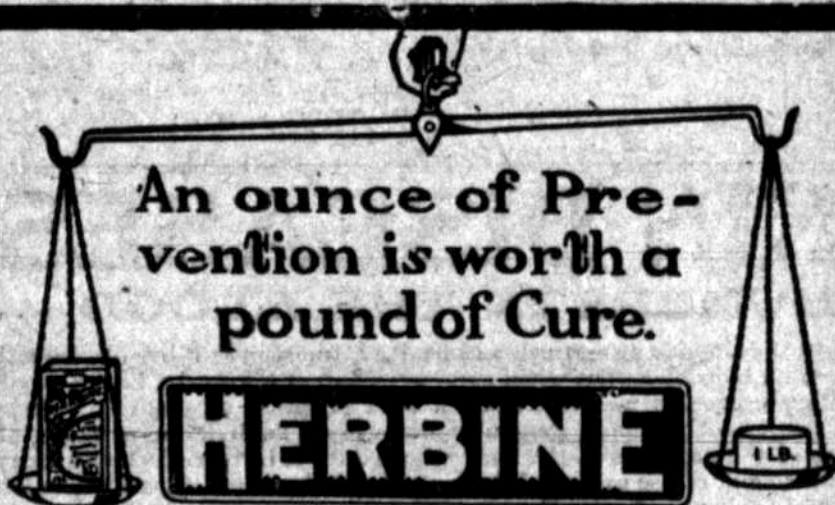
