PACIFIC COLLEGE ENDOWMENT.

Early in the year plans were laid for a campaign to be made for securing subscriptions for an endowment fund for Pacific College. A public meeting was held at the college which was attended by many of our citizens, when the sentiment expressed was all favorable for such an undertaking. Accordingly President McGrew was released from further duties in the class room for the remainder of the year, he having consented to take up the work of soliciting for the endowment, both here in Oregon and in other territory that might be selected for making the canvass. His health, which had been rather uncertain for several months, grew worse soon after this and he finally, on the advice of his physician, severed his connection with the college and gave up the work.

This unfavorable turn in the affairs of the college delayed the work and not until quite recently has anything been done in the way of soliciting for the endowment, but with the little preliminary work that has been inaugurated, enough has been accomplished to test the proposition among our home people and those having the work in charge are glad to be able to state that the outlook is very encouraging.

With the proposition as it has been undertaken the sum of \$50,000 must be subscribed on or before January 1, 1908, in order to make the obligations binding. Subscriptions may be paid in five annual payments if the subscriber so desires. A person giving \$100 signs an obligation as follows:

For the purpose of creating a Permanent Endowment Fund for Pacific College, I hereby pledge and agree to pay the treasurer of Pacific College for such fund the sum of one hundred dollars as follows: Twenty dollars on or before January 1st, 1909, and a like sum of twenty dollars on the first day of January of each year thereafter until the above sum is paid, with interest from January 1, 1908, at the rate of six per cent per annum, payable annually. No part of this pledge shall be due and payable unless the sum of \$50,000 shall be secured by January 1st, 1908. When the endowment fund subscribed shall equal or exceed the sum of \$50,000, Pacific College shall notify me either verbally or in writing, and any of the amount subscribed by me and paid within thirty days shall draw no interest.

A canvass was first made of the members of the Friends churches at Newberg, Chehalis Center and Rex, and subscriptions amounting to more than \$10,000 were taken. Other subscriptions have been taken from a few of the business men of Newberg and some of the friends of the college in Portland and the amount now subscribed aggregates \$12,000. Many of the business men of Newberg have the matter under consideration and have signified a willingness to do their part, all of which gives a very encouraging outlook for the ultimate consummation of the very worthy undertaking.

No college on the coast can show better results for the money expended and no college has done more for the town where it is located than Pacific College has done for Newberg. In fact the

college is responsible to a larger degree than any other one thing for the high standing Newberg sustains in the eyes of the people, when comparison is made with other small cities in the valley. It is a fact, however that no college has ever been able to continue to meet the demands made upon it without an endowment fund back of it, and Pacific College has reached a period in its history where something must be done to put it on a better financial footing. The trustees feel confident that if the present effort is successful it will put them in a position to go to men like Mr. Carnegie, who are helping worthy colleges, with an appeal that will meet with a favorable response. They also hope that when the home people have shown the proper spirit in helping to get an endowment fund started, they may be able to interest some parties in helping meet the cost of a better building, which is very much needed.

In view of all these things it is to be hoped that every man in the community, who has not already subscribed to the endowment fund, will see his way clear to come forward at once and help the good work along by making as liberal a subscription as possible. If the college is worth anything to Newberg, and everybody knows it is, the stronger it can be made as an institution of learning, the more it will be worth to the community. Don't forget this when you are considering the endowment proposition.
