Contract Let.

The contract has been let to J.
L. Fletcher, of McMinnville, for
the construction of the two story
brick building on First street,
which is to be built by the Union
Building Company. With the
exception of the brick which are
being furnished by the company,
Mr. Fletcher's contract covers
everything from the foundation
up, including the wiring, plumb-
ing and installing the steam
heating plant.

As stated when the plans for
the building were first announced
in the Graphic, the corner room
has been leased to the Bank of
Newberg, the store room to the
Parker Mercantile Co., while the
remainder of the building, with
the exception of six office rooms
on the second floor, will be fitted
up for a first class hotel.

The excavation for the base-
ment, which will be used for the
heating plant and a storage
room for the hotel, is 36x60 feet
while the size of the building will
be 85 feet on College street with
a frontage of 115 feet on First
street. The foundation will be
of concrete and the two fronts of
the building facing on College
and First streets will be faced
with a light chocolate colored dry
pressed brick. When completed
it will be one of the best business
blocks in Yamhill county.

Mr. Fletcher will begin work
on the building at once with a
large force of men and he hopes
to complete it in about four
months.
