



Springbrook School Graduating Exercises.

Five students of the eighth grade of the Springbrook public school, which by the way included the whole class, successfully run the gauntlet of examinations and on last Friday evening were awarded certificates of graduation. The exercises were held in the schoolhouse, which proved inadequate to accommodate all the good people of Springbrook and surrounding country who were present. The graduates were Oscar Calkins, Vindetta and Esther Wallen, Paul Lewis and Myrtle Burke.

The program of the evening was interesting and varied. The literary part, consisting of productions by the eighth graders as well as recitations by others was interspersed with good musical selections, particularly by a quartet composed of Mr. and Mrs. F. A. Hadley, Cecil Hadley and Minnie Kincaid, instrumental music by Ola Heater and a song by Eva Hadley. Recitations were given by Mary Sanders, Mary Mills and Elwin Willis. A pretty drill was presented by the pupils.

Of the graduates, Oscar Calkins spoke on "Local History," Vindetta Wallen on "Schools and their Growth," Paul Lewis read the class prophecy and Myrtle Burke delivered the valedictory. The diplomas were presented by Clarence Clemenson, formerly principal of the Springbrook school, accompanied by fitting words.

An appropriate, spicy address was delivered to the class by County Superintendent L. R. Alderman, followed by closing remarks by the principal, R. W. Swink. He and his assistant, Miss Rush, have given such satisfaction that they are retained for another year. Harvey Wright of Pacific College closed the exercises with a benediction.

The Springbrook class is the only one in the county which went through the state examinations without the loss of one. Last year Glen Harnden finished the eighth grade at Springbrook with the highest grade of any pupil in the county and the previous year the same honor was won by Florence Rees of the same school, both of whom are now doing excellent work in Pacific College. All this speaks well for Springbrook and the public school.

Memorial Day.

The decoration day exercises were carried out according to the program. In the forenoon the G. A. R. post and the W. R. C. and the Sons of Veterans formed in line on First street and headed by the band, marched to the cemetery, followed by a large number of other citizens, where the usual services were held, after which the graves were decorated.

In the afternoon the crowd gathered in the grove to listen to the exercises, consisting of music by the band, singing by the choir, recitations and songs.

R. B. Linville, in a very felicitous little speech introduced the orator of the day, Judge H. H. Northup, of Portland, who delivered one of the best memorial addresses ever given in Newberg. In the course of the address he outlined the causes leading up to the Revolution of 1776, and spoke of the principal leaders who carried the revolution to a successful termination. Following this he carried out the same line of thought regarding the Rebellion of '61, and withal it was an address that was full of interest as well as instructive to the young student in history and

was well worth hearing. Judge Northup is a speaker of no mean ability and he will have a good audience should he return to Newberg in the future.

The old veterans feel grateful to all who assisted in the various exercises of the day.

He could probably tell in a minute or so, but you must use it and wait developments to find out.

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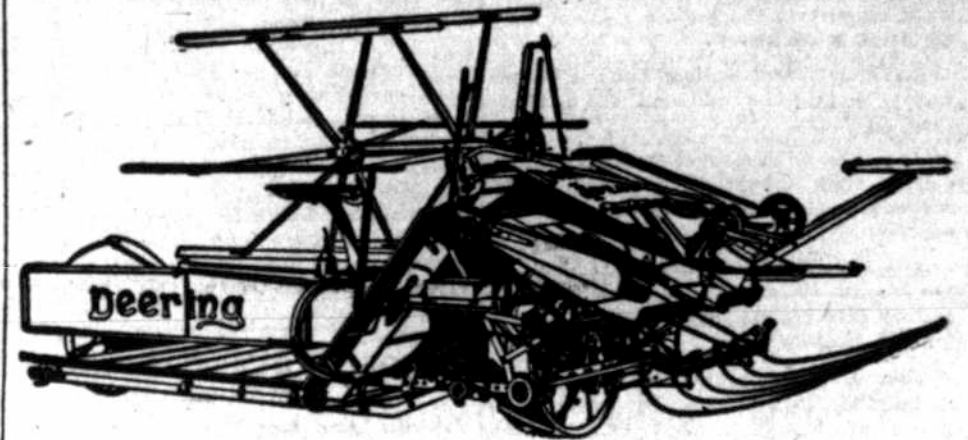
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
