By the time we have rounded out three full days in the last week of June with the festivities of the G. A. R. Encampment, Newberg will no doubt feel very well satisfied to let other points in the county do the celebrating act on the glorious Fourth.

Our business houses and our residences ought to be well decorated with flags during the G. A. R. Encampment. In order to make such decorations as nearly universal as possible, can't some arrangement be made to enable the people to buy the flags at wholesale prices? Who will take the matter up?

Present indications point to a large attendance here at the G. A. R. Encampment and all our citizens should lose no time in putting their homes and surrounding premises in shape for making a favorable impression on the visitors. A little here and there will do much in the way of making things about town look neat and presentable, and we owe it to ourselves to do our best.

As further proof of the claim made by the Graphic that the Oregon Agricultural College is so conducted that the farmer boys are known among the students as "hayseeds" and are not made the "main push," as they should be, we cite the fact that while the graduates this year from the agricultural department number fourteen and household science nine, the graduates from the electrical and other departments number forty-five.

The crown prince of Spain has been baptized and loaded down with the name Alphonse Pio Christino Eduardo Francisco Gueleemo Carlos Enrique Fernando Antonio, and this in face of the fact that the hot season is approaching with the hives and teeth cutting to be expected. The kid has much to contend with at this early stage of its existence, and nothing but a good constitution and plenty of soothing syrup will pull it through.

With the assurance that we will have a full crop of home grown candidates for the toga of United States Senator, the report comes from San Francisco that Joaquin Miller is arranging to return to Oregon and enter the race under the direct primary law. Since our old friend, Tony Noltner, was a partner in the newspaper business with Miller, during the early days of news-

paperdom in Oregon, we would suggest that he also enter the race in order to add zest to the campaign. Mr. Noltner don't wear high topped boots, neither does he write poetry, but he is a walking encyclopedia on Oregon politics.

Great enthusiasm is being shown over the prospect of the rose show that is to be held in Portland on Thursday and Friday of next week. On Thursday a competitive exhibit will be held at the Forestry building and a floral parade of 2000 school children will be an attractive feature. Friday will be fiesta day with a monster parade of floral decorated automobiles, floats, equestrian clubs, military and bands, trophy and cash prizes. On Saturday the Oregon Development League Convention will be held. Reduced rates on the railroads are being advertised.

In the light of Colonel Watter-son's new diagnosis of politics, says the Oregonian, the position of the Democratic party seems more difficult and its future more doubtful than ever. What the party shall do to be saved he doesn't know; but he says: "Another defeat means its extinction. It means the loss of the South to the Democracy. It means a new, maybe a long lease of power to the Republicans. But, if the Democratic party goes down—and we say this in kindness no less than in candor—Mr. Bryan, too, will go down, and in the revival of a socialized Democracy that follows, it will be Hearst, not Bryan, who will hold the whip hand, and the worst of this to Mr. Bryan will be that the mass and body of Democrats—particularly and universally at the South—will hold him answerable."

District Attorney John Manning has issued an edict, that beginning with next Sunday, the saloons in Portland must close every Sunday in the year and remain closed. The liquor men estimate that their losses on account of putting on the lid will reach the sum of \$85,400 a month, which divided by four, makes the neat little sum of \$21,350 which has been going over the bars in the metropolis of Oregon every Sunday, for the estimates are doubtless made on past receipts. One of the best known liquor men of the city is reported to have said that he expects to see Oregon a Prohibition state within five years, and men who are engaged in the saloon business must be credited with making as close a study of the trend of the times as anybody. In a way the movement has seemed rather slow, sometimes, but to those who do not believe that the saloon has any right to exist things are looking pretty good.

Wednesday of next week is pioneer day in Portland, when the boys and girls who followed the slow plodding ox teams across the parched desert plains, back in the Forties and Fifties, on the long tramp to the Oregon country where Uncle Sam held out an offer of a full section of land to man and wife, will meet and live the old days over again. They are no longer young and the white locks and tottering step tell the tale of long years spent in pioneering in this great Northwest country, rich in resources, and now making rapid strides in the way of development. Among the number the death roll has been a long one during the past year and according to the course of nature the funeral service will be said over the graves of many more the coming year. Their annual gathering this year comes the week of the rose carnival. Let each and every one of them be showered with the finest roses that can be gathered.

Good Citizenship.
