### High School Graduating Exercises.

It was "town talk" Saturday morning that the High School graduating exercises of the evening before were the most successful ever held in Newberg from every point of view. The program was excellent throughout and was in itself a good advertisement for the Newberg schools.

The names of the graduates with the subjects of their productions, follow: Mabel Duncan, Whitewash; Leola Glass, Cranks; Lola Kaufman, the Public School as a Means of Americanizing the Alien; Ella Nelson, Oregon Pioneers; Claude Newlin, Modern Slavery; Vivienne Miller, The Old Man Eloquent. Of these productions, those by Claude Newlin and Ella Nelson were spoken. Lola Kaufman read a class history which, spicy and full of timely hits, was a feature of the evening.

The diplomas were presented by Principal Kirk, who in the course of a few remarks stated that the attendance this year had gone over the 650 mark, which had necessitated the employment of fourteen teachers.

The Pacific College scholarship, awarded annually to the member of the class achieving the highest rank, was awarded to Claude M. Newlin.

Pres. E. D. Ressler, of the Monmouth State Normal was introduced and delivered a helpful address to the class. In prefacing his remarks he spoke in a very complimentary way of the prominent place which Newberg holds in the various activities of the state, paying a special tribute to Pacific College for the many victories she has won in literary and forensic contests. He stated in an emphatic manner the advantages of living in a college town.

In his address he urged three or four things strongly upon the young people before him—thorough preparation for the work before them, perseverance, confidence in themselves and faith in those about them. Pres. Ressler has the happy faculty of putting just enough flavoring, in the way of timely stories, into his remarks to make them effective.

Another feature of the evening was the very excellent musical program which was worthy of special notice. Miss Freda Gist and Miss Lota Fleury gave vocal solos, Mr. and Mrs. E. A. Newbe a vocal duet and Mrs. C. B. Wilson and Miss Mabelle Gardner a piano duet.

### Will Present Flag.
