



BIG CANNERY ASSURED.

Proposition of Seattle Company Accepted—Site on Railroad Chosen.

The proposition of a big cannery to be established in Newberg began to take form on last Saturday evening when Mr. Bussell, the president and manager of the Weber-Bussell Canning Co. of Seattle, arrived in town and began to look the ground over. Flattering reports had been sent to the company by W. J. Bruggermann, their representative, who is here buying and shipping cherries to Puyallup, where they operate a cannery, and things looked so good to Mr. Bussell that he went immediately to Springbrook and offered to buy the cannery located there, in order to get to business at once, but his offer to buy was turned down and he took the matter up here.

On Monday morning he stated that his company would establish a cannery here of good capacity if the people would donate a site of about two acres. He mentioned the site where the big warehouse stands on the north side of the railroad track at the Main street crossing, and said his company would pay for the building if our people would buy the land and enough more to make the amount desired.

At a meeting held in the Odd Fellows hall on Monday evening a committee composed of Clarence Butt, W. S. Parker and John Larkin, was appointed to look up the matter of a site and report at a mass meeting to be held in Edwards grove on the following evening. This meeting was largely attended and much enthusiasm was shown. The committee reported that the warehouse site was not practicable as the real estate was held too high to be reached, but that two and a quarter acres with good frontage on the railroad and located on the north side of the track directly north of the public school grounds, could be secured at a cost of \$1000.

Mr. Bruggermann stated that he thought this site would be satisfactory to the company and by unanimous vote the committee was instructed to inform the company that Newberg was ready to do business with them.

A subscription paper was opened and a quarter of the amount required was put down on the spot. H. R. Morris, W. S. Stull, J. W. Coffin and N. F. Byers were appointed to solicit further and the full amount will be raised before this reaches our readers.

The canning company desires to handle the pear crop this season and they indicate that they will install a plant immediately for that purpose. Much enthusiasm is being manifested by the farmers and small fruit growers in the community over the fact that Newberg is to have a cannery of sufficient capacity to handle all the stuff they will offer, and they say they will lay plans at once to largely increase the output of their places for this purpose.

A ride about the country immediately surrounding Newberg shows a very perceptible increase in the production of small fruits and berries, and yet it is evident that we have only gone far enough to barely test the possibilities of our soil along this line of profitable industry. The next few years will show a development that will mark a new era in the progress of the community.

"Vacation should bring rest, or rather recreation, to muscles and nerves. This does not necessarily mean absolute quiet a kimono, a novel and a box of chocolates. It means change of scene, movement and thought.

"The school teacher, or worker in a small town should reach out for a broader viewpoint. It will be good for her to visit some bustling city with galleries, museums, yes, and roof gardens and gay restaurants, as well as points of historical interest. All through her school term she has lived in an atmosphere of petty gossip and has been giving forth, never drawing inspiration from others. 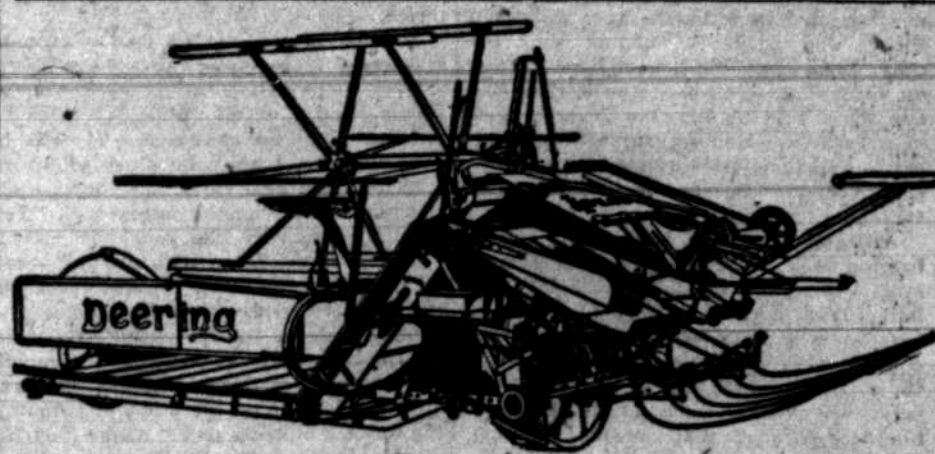
