There could hardly be a more successful season for the grower of small fruits than this has proven. Crops have all been heavy and prices good, in some cases gilt edge in fact. The owner of the small fruit tract has come into his own and prosperity smiles upon the whole neighborhood.

A resident of Pasadena, California, who has traveled extensively over the United States, visited Newberg this week, having been through this section over twenty years ago. He observed with interest the great development which Chehalis valley has made and prophesied that with its unsurpassed wealth of natural resources, this development will continue rapidly. In fact he declared that land will yet increase many times in value and that the day will come when some land hereabouts will bring one thousand dollars per acre as in Southern California. That new canneries will help some.

In a drive over the valley one is forcibly impressed with the change which has taken place within the past few years in the agricultural products grown. Not long ago little but grain could be seen, while now, numerous small fields of corn are in evidence and fields of thriving clover. Large wheat farms are being divided into small dairy farms and the changes mentioned follow naturally and speak well for the development of Chehalis valley. And greater change will come with the establishment of that new cannery. There will be more small cherry and pear orchards, more berry patches, more corn fields, more truck gardening. We do not yet realize the wealth which can be produced in our peerless little valley nor the great population it will support.

The colonist rates go into effect September 1st and continue until October 31st. This is the rate that brings the actual settlers to Oregon and means that people can come to this state from Kansas City, St. Paul, Minneapolis and all the great territory between the Missouri river and the Rocky mountains for \$25. (To all points east of Umatilla, \$22.50; St. Louis, \$30; from Chicago \$33. It should be borne in mind that the most important thing of all is that these people must buy their tickets direct to the towns they want to reach. This is true with regard to Medford, Eugene, The Dalles, Astoria and every other city or town in Oregon. Many people get the impression that they can come to Portland and then continue their trip to point of destination, and it devolves upon each and every community in Oregon to advertise this fact.

"RATHER TO BE CHOSEN THAN GREAT RICHES."

"There are other reasons besides extra good soil, salubrious climate, etc., that cause people to leave other states and settle in Oregon," says the Dallas Itemizer and proceeds to explain as follows: "A gentleman from the South gave us the other day his reasons for immigrating. While on a visit here the thing that most particularly impressed him in favor of Oregon was its freedom from lawlessness and toughs and criminals of every kind, as compared with places of the same population in his native state. While on that visit here he visited a good-sized

town where a certain large circus was being held—one that he had seen many times in his home town, and the contrast he drew between the happenings in the two places was certainly most complimentary to Oregon's town. During the whole day here he failed to notice anyone under the influence of liquor, saw no arrests made, there were no fights, gun plays, nor anything calculated to prohibit the most fastidious and refined from participating with ease in all the advertised pleasures of the show. Ladies and young girls were able to and did attend the show without escorts and seemed to have no anticipation of being treated in anything but a gentlemanly manner by all classes of the male sex. During an exhibition of the same circus in his old state, and even in its prohibition towns, there would have been drunken men, a battalion of policemen would have had their hands full to preserve even a semblance of order and decorum, there would have happened fights innumerable, robberies by the score and all would have thought they were getting off lucky if there were not several people killed, maimed and fatally injured. Women would not think of venturing out except under man's protection, and the police court would hold continual session to clear the docket of the many cases before it for disobedience of the laws of the city and state. The contrast was so pleasing that this gentleman then and there made up his mind to go back to his native state, dispose of his holdings, and bring his family to hereafter reside where law and order could be and would be enforced. Such a move entailed considerable expense and probably some loss financially, but he considered such a move well worth the cost, and he now sees no occasion to regret his decision. May Oregon forever continue to hold the fair name she now has, a perfect example of well governed and law abiding communities and may many others be constrained to come and make their homes with us by reason of it being so."
