S. E. Watkins, architect and builder, who came out from Warsaw, Indiana, to visit his mother, Mrs. W. H. Oregon Yearly Meeting of the Friends church opens here next Tuesday, July 16, the sessions of which promise to be unusually interesting. More speakers from a distance will be present than common who will add interest and enthusiasm to the sessions. Of these none will be heard with greater appreciation than Prof. Thos. Newlin of North Carolina, who was the first clerk of the Yearly Meeting in which capacity he served until his removal seven years ago. On temperance day, July 20, Newberg will be highly favored with the presence of Judge Samuel Artman of Indiana, who recently achieved national fame through his decision against the saloon which he declared to be a public nuisance and its right of existence unconstitutional. Among the visiting speakers will also be Rev. Isom Wooten of Iowa, Rev. Chas. Replogle of Everett, Washington and Rev. Lindley M. Wells of Berkeley, California. The public is invited to attend the various sessions.

Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Parker have been busily engaged the past weeks in starting an industry which bids fair to take on no inconsiderable proportions. Some time ago as a sort of feeler they sent out a few letters to Portland parties announcing their intention of putting up choice Oregon fruit with greatest care in glass jars and inviting inquiries relative thereto. In answer to replies to some of these letters Mr. Parker made trips to the city with samples and met with such gratifying success in taking orders from private families that he was assured that they would have no trouble at the market end of the line. They have been putting up nearly all kinds of fruits in season, such as strawberries, currant and gooseberry jells and jams, raspberries, loganberries, cherries, etc. They are particular in selecting the finest fruits which they can with greatest care—and the finished product is something that will sell anywhere at a good margin. They have already put up over a thousand jars and say they are only well started. Great oaks from little acorns grow, as we have heard it intimated. Who knows but what another big industry for Newberg is now in the budding stage?

A Newberg picnic was held in Portland on the Fourth by the populous Newberg settlement of the metropolis. The promised report of it has not reached the Graphic.

At the cherry fair, held at Salem this week, C. E. Hoskins, of Springbrook, received first prize on ten pound display of the Hoskins cherry and first prize on best seedling cherry. The cherry growers of this neighborhood were too busy taking care of their crops to make exhibits at the fair.

J. C. Clemenson has sold a block on north Meridian street lying between W. B. Sims' gardens and the railroad to A. B. Lyon, a recent arrival from Seattle, who is now occupying the cottage just west of the laundry. Mr. Lyon has already begun the erection of a seven room cottage on his new property.

Past Adjutant General R. V. Pratt, of Portland, who was the guest of Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Clemmens during the recent G. A. R. encampment here, "couldn't stay away." He liked the town and surrounding country so well that he returned Tuesday for a further view and was taken by Mr. Clemmens on a ride through the valley, much to his delight.

D. Estle and Sam McVey have purchased the gravel barge built by Contractor Geo. Lea, and are installing machinery on it with which they will load gravel from the river bed and place it for disposal at the Newberg landing. This is good news, having as direct a relation as it does to the improvement of the streets of Newberg and roads of surrounding territory.

Mrs. Nellie Ward of Tacoma died of tuberculosis on Parrett mountain Monday at the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Jack Smith, at the age of twenty-seven years. The funeral services were conducted at the home Wednesday afternoon by Rev. Herbert Cash, and were largely attended by friends and neighbors. Interment was made in Roselawn cemetery. The deceased leaves a devoted husband and three children.

Professor, or as he is known in Oregon, President Newlin and wife, of Guilford College, North Carolina, arrived as expected last week after an absence of seven years since which time they have been greeting old friends on every hand.
