The big new cannery which Newberg is to have by fall has already given the town wide and favorable notice in the state through both the editorial and news columns of the Portland daily press. Newberg is acquiring an enviable reputation as the town which gets things.

Wide-awake Newberg citizens, having landed the cannery, are now looking for a milk condenser. With both river and railroad transportation, Newberg is able to draw from a much wider territory than are most places. Its location for such an institution is ideal. One man who has given the matter a good deal of thought says that Newberg can guarantee a company the product from one thousand cows. A pretty tempting bait that, for capital interested in this direction.

In commenting upon the successful celebration held at Hillsboro, the Independent makes this pertinent observation: "When the city bought that park they did this city more good than any other one thing that has happened in many a month." There's food for thought here for Newberg. As long as the Edwards grove is at the disposal of the town, the need of the public park is not recognized. But should the grove be sold and turned to private use, what then? Newberg had better lock the door on the proposition before the horse is stolen.

By way of reminder, Newberg is the home of the Spaulding Logging Company, one of the big concerns of its kind in Oregon; of the Pacific Face Brick Company, which furnishes the material for Portland's best brick blocks; of the Oregon Handle Manufacturing Company, which supplies the Northwest with handles for tools of all kinds; of two flouring mills, common brick factory, tile mill, ice manufactory, iron works; of a big new cannery within a few weeks, while within a radius of five miles there are fifty fruit evaporators. And still we are not satisfied. There are a few more things we want and we're going to get them. Just watch us.

Even such a distressing accident as that noted below by the Oregonian is made to show up the agricultural possibilities of this great Northwest of ours in a way which needs no comment. "The harvest season is subject to accidents of a type all its own. A most peculiar and distressing one was that in which a farmer of Eastern Washington, with a sturdy swing of his scythe, cut off both legs of his four-year-old son, who was playing in the wheat. It seems incredible that standing wheat could be so dense

that a mower would not be able to distinguish in it the form of a child, at such close range, or within the stroke of his scythe. The boy, it is said, was playing with other children in the wheat, a statement that causes additional wonder at the possibility of such an accident."

In six weeks more the colonist rates to Oregon will be in effect again, continuing for sixty days. In order to get the full benefit of them, every commercial organization should get busy with its correspondence with prospective settlers. During this vacation period the boys and girls have the time to write their friends "back East" and tell them about the Oregon country. As an illustration of what can be accomplished by this means, the school children of a single district in one of our coast counties doubled the school population of that school district merely through correspondence, necessitating the construction of an additional school building.

Hood River prides itself on being the "apple city," Ashland may be known as the "peach city," and since its successful cherry fair Salem claims the title of "cherry city." Newberg, with its two score and more of fruit evaporators within a small radius may apply for the name of the "prune city." Don't smile and prepare to work off an old gag. We glory in the much maligned prune and don't care who knows it. Take this, from Editor Williamson of the Agriculturist: "Some of the Oregon newspapers have been publishing stale, old drives at the prune, but the prune has become a good thing in Oregon. Prunes brought more money into the state last year than any other one fruit, and they will bring in fifty per cent more money this year than last."

That generous hospitality proves its own reward is being demonstrated by the good things which the state press continues to say about Newberg as reported by the visitors entertained here during the G. A. R. encampment. For instance, these headlines are before us in an Albany paper: "Newberg all right, so say the Albany visitors, who returned from the encampment full of pleasant memories and good cheer." This is just a fair sample of the encomiums expressed on Newberg's hospitality. Our attractions and advantages are advertised as well. Note this as an example from the Forest Grove Times: "Members of the G. A. R. coming home from the convention at Newberg speak very highly of the water supply of that city—that the water comes from an inexhaustible source in springs back in the hills and it is cold and pure," following which the Times enters the plea for better water supply in its own town. This is the best and most effective advertising possible. Our bread is coming back to us in baskets and well buttered.

**FINDING A MARKET FOR FRUIT**

The prosperous farming Yamhill community of which Newberg is the center and shipping point will, after this season, be furnished with a market for the large surplus of fruits and vegetables that are grown there. A cannery is to be built at once to take care of this product, the purpose being to have it in readiness to handle fall fruits and vegetables.

This is a step in unison with that of progress, and one that promises to be of permanent value. Industry that compels tribute from the soil should be matched by enterprise that turns this tribute to full account. The spectacle of fruit, as fine as the finest grown anywhere, rotting on the ground by the ton, year after year, had a most depressing effect upon farmers and was long viewed with unconcealed wonder by travelers up and down the Willamette Valley. The ex-

cuse of "no market" has longed ceased to be a legitimate one, so far as dried and canned fruits are concerned. When Oregon was brought in touch with the great world this reason vanished, but the fruit in many localities has perished just the same—partly in accordance with the fixed habit of letting it rot and partly because there was not among local growers men with capital and enterprise sufficient to install a cannery. Both these obstacles have been overcome in Newberg, and after this year surplus fruit grown in the sheltered valley of Chehalem will not be allowed to go to waste.—Oregonian.
