### How The National Forests Serve the Public.

"The Use of the National Forests," a publication just printed by the Department of Agriculture, is a brief, clear manual for public information as to the forest policy of the National Government.

It is too true, as the short preface to the public says, that "many people do not know what National Forests are. Others may have heard much about them, but have no idea of their true purpose and use." It is the object of this publication to explain just what the National Forests mean, what they are for and how to use them.

In the first place, it is explained how the Forests are created and how their boundaries are drawn. Next, their direct use and value are shown from the point of view of the homeseeker, the prospector and miner, the user of timber, the user of the range, the user of water, and other users of forest resources. Third, it is shown how the Forests are intended for use, for the production of usable products, and for the establishment and maintenance of homes; how on all of them the timber is protected from fire, the water flow is kept steady, the forage on the range is increased and guarded from abuse; and how, in addition, they serve as great public playgrounds and as breeding places and refuges for game. Finally, the management of the National Forests is described.

Here it is that the great usefulness of the forests is brought out most clearly and strikingly; for the Forests are managed by the people in their own interests, and every means is used to meet the desires and wants of all forest users half way by dealing with them in the main directly on the ground and in all cases with the utmost practicable dispatch and freedom from red tape.

In a word, the special interest of this manual lies in its showing that the forest policy of the government, both in principle and in practice, is for the benefit of the ordinary man, for the benefit of every citizen equally. There is still a tendency to think of the National Forests as "preserves" closed to use, and to leave the public lands exposed to unregulated individual exploitation. Where these misapprehensions still prevail "The Use of the National Forests" will go far to correct them.

The book is written by Mr. Frederick E. Olmsted, whose intimate knowledge of conditions in the West and the policy under which the National Forests are managed especially fits him to deal with the subject.

### Timely Topics Tersely Treated.

As one of our white ribbon women was distributing literature during the encampment the question was asked her, "Why do you circulate literature on temperance—you have no saloon here?" "To keep out the saloon," was her answer. It is true we have no saloon but we know beer and other intoxicating liquors are drunk and drunken men stagger on our streets once in awhile.

White ribboners, bear in mind to wear your badge of membership of our organization, when you come to hear Mr. Artman next Saturday at 2 p. m. The sight of the knot of white ribbon, showing as it does the sentiment behind it, ought to and will help in this great work.

Another year is drawing toward its close. In a few weeks will occur our county convention. Has each officer and member done her part faithfully or has something been left undone? The reports will show how we have fulfilled the work which we have undertaken for "God and Home and every Land." It is not a small undertaking to help fight the liquor traffic and every little helps. A little word of warning given to your Sunday school class, or spoken in a kindly way at a chance meeting with the young will often turn their thoughts in the right direction and they may thus be led to never taste the first glass of intoxicating drinks.

How rapidly a good work advances when a large number of people unite to do what is right, as witness, the closing of the saloons and stores on Sunday. They hie them away to Oregon City, and lol the next Sunday finds its doors locked, then to Canby and there they find the "lid" on. Hasten the time when Newberg will fasten the lid on tight for Sunday closing of confectionery and grocery stores.

### The First Dry Year.

Among the Oregon towns which voted out the saloon about a year ago through the provisions of the local option law was Albany. In a brief retrospect the Albany Democrat reviews the general results of that action, which will be found to be representative of those in other towns which made the same change. The observations made by the Democrat follow:

Albany has just completed its first year as a "dry" city. The result will be viewed by different people in different ways, according to predilection. Some things, though, are facts.

There are fifty less empty houses. While a good many people have gone away, more have come to Albany showing a decided gain in numbers, and it is said financially.

Business has been remarkably good along nearly all lines. General merchandise trade has increased in the different stores from 10 to 50 or more per cent. The business of the banks has been the best in the history of the city. Deposits have increased forty per cent.

The city government has been run on the taxes of its property owners, and hardly any difference is noticed by the tax payer.

Morally the city has improved; but liquor continues to be drunk here. There are two or three blind pigs, and considerable liquor is shipped in by express from Portland houses, who keep the mails flooded with their circulars; but the amount consumed here is probably not a fifth of what it was with ten saloons wide open.

Albany is very much alive and the prospects for the coming year are very bright.
