Shipment will be made as soon as a car can be obtained.

Dr. G. U. Snapp has sold his residence to Luther Shirley, the house to be removed to the Shirley lots just north of Frank Taylor's residence and placed on the foundation for a stated price.

Prof. Harvey D. Crumly arrived home from his trip to Colorado Tuesday evening looking "brown and seer" from a good coat of tan of fast colors, put on by contact of wind and eternal sunshine. He spent several days at Caldwell, Idaho, on his return trip, chasing the festive deer in company with the Mills boys and feasting on—bacon.

Rev. Isom P. Wooten, who spent the most of the summer at Kent, Washington, says that previous to the establishing of milk condensers in that locality land was very low in price, as the owners were scarcely making more than a bare living, but now ranchers are making a hundred a year on every cow they milk, and land is held at \$200 per acre and up and not for sale at these prices. Concrete piers support 12x12 sills and the joists are 3x12, all of which gives great strength to the floor. The building is fast assuming proportions and when completed it will be the biggest thing out of doors in Yamhill county.

Judge Bird was invited to attend the meeting and the road question was talked over in an informal way.

A quiet wedding occurred on Sunday September 1st, at the bride's home, when Mrs. Nettie Burlingame and Sam'l A. Diamond were united in marriage in the presence of their near relatives, Rev. C. L. Hamilton, officiating. They left on the evening train for Portland where they spent a few days, the guests of the bride's sister, Mrs. Lewis.

Allen Smith and wife are expecting to start for the Friends mission field in Alaska with their son Harlan next week, with a view of assisting in the work during the coming winter. The committee in charge of the work contemplates making extensive improvements about the mission and as both father and son are good carpenters the work will be in efficient hands.

During the past month the cobwebs have been brushed from the forty or more prune evaporators in and about Newberg, furnaces have been inspected and repaired where necessary, and everything put in shape to begin the work of taking care of the crop which is good. Many of the plants are already at work in a small way and by the first of next week they will all be running on full time with a full force of hands, all full of prunes. If the weather continues to be fine until the crop can be cared for, growers will be able to fix the children up for school in good shape this year and also swell their bank accounts very materially, as prices are at the top notch.

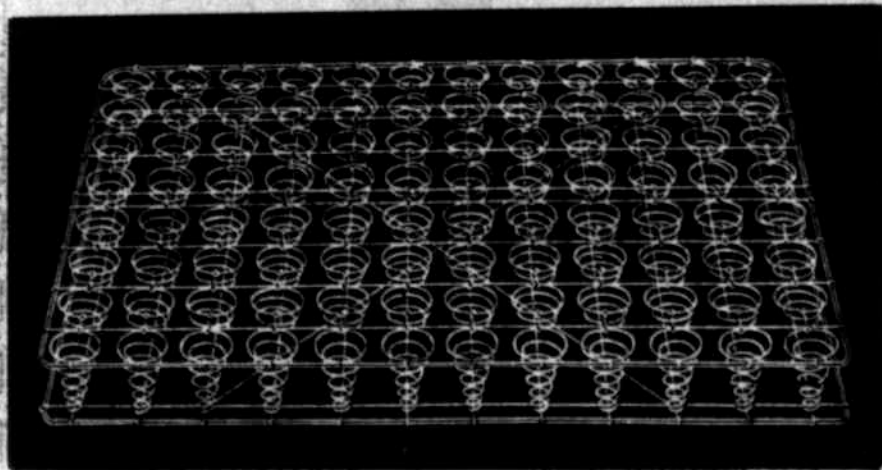
