Public School Opens.

On last Monday morning the bell cord at the big school building was pulled and the old bell announced the opening of the new school year, with the result that the homes of Newberg swarmed and 546 of the coming men and women of the country kept step with elastic tread, on their way to the place of learning for enrollment. This is 142 more than were enrolled the first day of last year, which makes a good showing for the growth of Newberg during the year. Where is there a town in the valley that can show a better record?

Last year the enrollment for the first day was 404 and within two weeks time the number was increased to 503. When the youngsters are all housed and counted this year the enrollment will no doubt exceed 700, which in itself makes a pretty fair population for a country village.

The work was begun by thirteen teachers but the board is already casting about for two more which will be necessary to handle the work.
