### RIGHT HAND OR BOTH HANDS.

Four-Fifths of the Babies Said to Be Ambidextrous.

Many reasons have been advanced for the prevalence of righthandedness. It is by some said to be the result of nursing and infantile treatment, to be due to early practice in writing and drawing, to be the outcome of warfare, education and heredity, the result of mechanical law and other remote causes, according to the Strand. Sir James Sawyer declares that the preferential use of the right hand is due to the fact that in primitive days man used the right hand for the purposes of offense, so as to keep the heart—the vital spot—as far as possible from the assault if an adversary. Recent experiments and observations, however, prove that singlehandedness is merely the result of faulty or restricted education.

It is a curious instance of human contrariness that should one eye, one ear or one leg of a child show signs of diminished vigor, the parents would instantly seek the cause of and, if possible, the remedy for that lamentable condition; yet for some inexplicable reason or prejudice the left hand of the average child is ruthlessly and deliberately neglected, until in mature years it is undeveloped, useless and almost unnecessary appendage.

Careful observations have shown that out of every hundred persons born into this world eighty are congenitally ambidextrous—that is to say, they will instinctively reach for an object with either hand, and only require proper instruction and training to develop both hands and arms to an equal degree of strength and skill.

Of the remaining twenty, seventeen will be right-handed, while the other three will show a natural bias toward the left hand. The cultivation of ambidexterity, therefore, offers no insuperable difficulties, and the economical, physiological and psychological advantages are enormous.

It is said that the Japanese soldiers can use their weapons with equal skill in either hand, for they are trained to be ambidextrous from childhood. At school they are taught to write and draw with both hands. In drawing and painting no supporting device whatever is used, the entire arm being employed. The German educational authorities, too, are at present giving considerable attention to left-hand work, especially in their technical and mechanical schools. The students are taught to saw, plane and hammer as well with the left hand as with the right, and the economical and industrial importance of ambidexterity is firmly impressed upon the minds of young men and women.

### LEGAL INFORMATION.

One to whom a tenant leases the premises is held, in Beck vs. Minnesota and W. Grain Co. (Iowa), 7 L. R. A. (N. S.) 960, to be as fully estopped to question the landlord's title as is the tenant himself.

The acknowledgment by a tenant that a right of way over adjoining property is permissive and subject to revocation is held, in Schwarz vs. Martin (Ky.), 7 L. R. A. (N. S.) 614, not to bind him after he secures title to the landlord's estate, to which the right of way is appurtenant.

After the maintenance of a railroad switch in a public street for twenty years under the express consent of the abutting owners, it is held, in Wolfard vs. Fisher (Ore.), 7 L. R. A. (N. S.) 961, that neither those who gave their consent nor their successors in title are entitled to injunctive relief against the alleged nuisance.

Failure of successors in title to one whose undivided deed to real estate has been recorded, to remove it from the record, is held, in Alabama Coal and Coke Co. vs. Gulf Coal and Coke Co. (Ala.), 7 L. R. A. (N. S.) 712, not to estop them from denying the title of a stranger who purchased the property in reliance on the record.

Couldn't Flatter Gov. Oglesby. Senator Shelby M. Cullom, of Illinois, tells this story of the late Gov. Oglesby:
