Yamhill's Apple Show.

The dates for the Yamhill county apple show that was to be held in McMinnville on the 4th, 5th and 6th of November, has been changed to October 31 and November 1 and 2. The prospect of a good display of apples are good. The county court has appointed a man to solicit fruit. Mr. Lownsdale and other officers of the Yamhill Co. Horticultural Society are doing everything they can to solicit fruit and to make the show a success. If any one has fruit to exhibit and are not called upon for their

exhibit, the committee would be only too glad to have their fruit left at some place where it could be collected and sent to McMinnville. Any fruit that is to be offered for exhibition before the opening day can be left at Macy Bros. furniture store in McMinnville. The citizens of Yamhill county are offering eight beautiful silver loving cups, one for each of the best plates of the following varieties of apples: Baldwin, Spitzenburg, Ben Davis, King, Northern Spies, Jonathan, Bell Flower and Yellow New Town. Ribbon will be given as first and second prizes on any other varieties that are displayed. Dielschneider Bros., jewelers of McMinnville, are offering a beautiful loving cup as a prize for the best commercial packed box of any variety of apples, and Mr. Lownsdale has phoned the committee that he will donate the services of expert packers to pack the apples for all exhibitors. He also stated that his commercial packed apples would not compete for the prize.

It is to the interest of every citizen of Yamhill county to make this show a success, as the entire exhibit will be taken to Portland and put on exhibition at the general state show to be held there. Nothing will advertise our county more than its notoriety for beautiful apples.

Through the courtesy of Mr. M. O. Lownsdale, the Walnut Growers Club, of Yamhill county has been granted permission to make a display of English walnuts grown in this county in connection with the display of apples. The Walnut Growers club is an organization of representative citizens having in view the encouragement of this new industry. At a recent meeting they decided to offer several prizes to be awarded to those making a display of English walnuts and to ask every person who has a tree from which walnuts were gathered this year to send some for exhibition.

Dr. E. E. Goucher, Mr. E. C. Apperson and Mr. W. H. Latourrette were appointed a committee to arrange these matters and it is their earnest desire to secure some English walnuts from every tree in the county. They would also like to have planted trees together with the number of acres.

They desire persons forwarding nuts to give particulars as to age of tree, and when possible, the fact relative to the amount of nuts the tree has produced annually, together with any other information that will be of benefit to interested persons. Due credit will be given to each person sending nuts and a full list of growers, as well as those forwarding nuts for exhibitions, will be published. This exhibit will be taken to Portland with the apple exhibit and displayed in that city at the "Apple Fair." It is therefore desired that English walnuts be sent to W. H. Latourrette, secretary of the club, or to either gentlemen, that every section of the country may be represented. We want to show that the culture of English walnuts is an established fact so far as Yamhill is concerned.

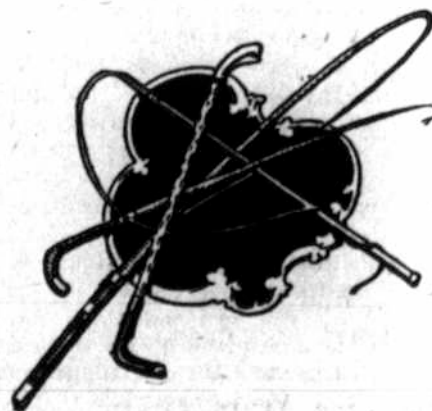
