Through a special act of Con-
gress it was required that for
one week all mail received should
be counted in every postoffice in
the United States. Following is
the count of the Newberg post-
office from October 13-19, inclu-
sive: Letters, 3115; post cards,
1204; second class matter, 1302;
third and fourth class matter,
339, making a total of 5960
pieces of mail sent from the office.
The revenue received therefrom
amounted to seventy-four dol-
lars.

Minnville sash and door factory.

foot of Wynooski street, died on
Monday morning at the age of
seventy-nine years after a linger-
ing illness. Interment was made
in the Hood View cemetery,
south of Sherwood, on Wednes-
day.

The sawmill of the Tillamook
Lumber company burned Sun-
day morning about 9 o'clock,
cause of fire unknown. As this
mill furnished the electric lights
for Tillamook City the county
seat now has to resort to the
oldtime kerosene lamp. Loss
\$25,000 partly covered by in-
surance.—Cloverdale Courier.

rison street. A bill of \$253.75

& McVey for gravel for \$406.53.
Sidewalks were ordered in as fol-
lows: Along the north side of
Sheridan street in front of lot 12,
block 17, Central addition; and
along the north side of Sheridan
street in front of lots 5 and 6,
block 7, Deskins' second addi-
tion; along the east side of Main
street from Sheridan street to
Second street; along the north
side of Hancock street, from
Howard street to School street;
along the south side of the Day-
ton road from First street to
Fifth; along the north side of
Second street from Main to
Grant street. All of said side-
walk must be built at the ex-
pense of adjacent property own-
ers.
