It has been definitely decided that the Oregon State Dairy Association will meet in Portland December 19-20. The Portland Commercial Club offers two gold medals, one for butter and one for cheese, while the Portland flouring mills put up a purse of \$100 in cash for the best general display.

\$4,275,135, is the amount the fruit growers of Oregon will receive for their crop for the present year, as estimated by Hon. W. K. Newell, president of the State Board of Horticulture. In making his estimate Mr. Newell does not deal with fancy prices, nor does he include the fruit that will be consumed on the farm.

Many new sprays for the San Jose scale are recommended in the East, but we believe that in Oregon the growers will find it to their advantage to stick to the lime-sulphur spray. It has stood the test of time and it is not claimed, even, for any other spray that it is more effective than the lime-sulphur spray.—Oregon Agriculturist.

The contract has been let for the grading of the Portland Country Club and Live Stock Association, and the architects are at work upon plans for the amphitheatre, club house and other buildings. As these grounds are within twenty minutes ride of the heart of the city, the attendance should be enormous, and the live stock display even better than that at the Lewis and Clark exposition.

Oregon never received a stronger endorsement than the following from the pen of Professor Charles Curtis, of the Ames, Iowa, Agricultural College: "There is nowhere on the face of the globe a land or people so dominant in the improvement of live stock or so potent in the production of the highest types of domestic animals as the British Islands. There is nowhere on the American continent a region affording conditions so closely allied to those of Great Britain as on the North Pacific Coast of the United States. The similarity is noticeable, not only in climatic conditions and natural environment, but also in the genuine enthusiasm and deep-seated faith in the industry possessed by the tillers of the soil."

Public Library.

A public library is the flower of the modern forms of co-operation, which secures for the individual luxuries which he could not afford otherwise.

Instead of buying so many books and magazines which wear out on the shelves after one reading, let us "pool our issues" and put the multitude of small sums in one fund, buy the best at the lowest prices, and then use the volumes so bought for the good of all. We need spend no more money each year for literature, but we need to save the wastage due to unused books, foolish purchases, book agents, commissions, and needless profits—and we can have a public library without other cost.

A good public library in this town may help our neighboring farmers as well as our townspeople. They cannot support public libraries in their small communities.

Their small school libraries give the children a taste for reading but give them nothing to gratify that taste when they leave school. Let us join our

forces for mutual advantage and get a better library and a wider community of interests.

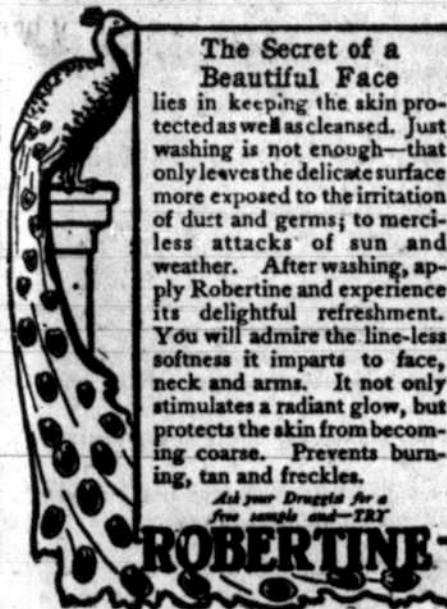
