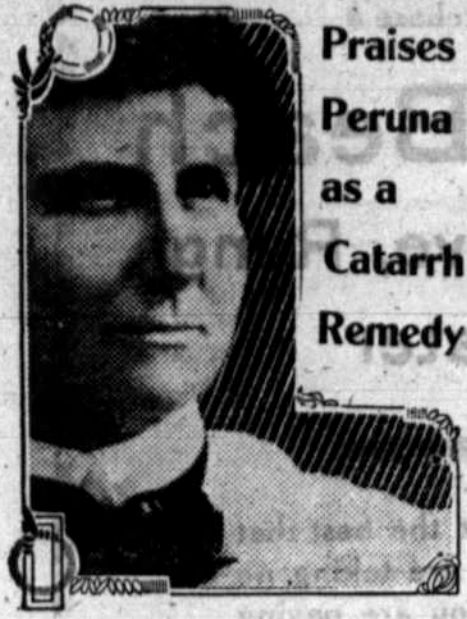

SHOE SHINING MAGNATES.

Much Money Made from Lowly Occupation.

Chicagoans of middle age easily remember the time when the bootblack with his box was conspicuous on nearly every city street. The course of industry has changed all that. The ragged urchin is gone, with the old-time newsboy, the horse cat, and other institutions of that day. Chicago has its shoes polished more than ever, but the work is done in the "shoe-shining parlor."

There are captains of industry in the shoe-shining business, as apparently in every other business. There are at least three, and they are Joseph Pacell and Angelo Geocarlis of Chicago and P. Smyreles of Grand Rapids, Mich. Their rise and that of the "shoe-shining parlor" is described by Arthur Sears Henning in the American Business Man for September. With Pacell and Geocarlis we are most concerned.

Pacell, an Italian from near Brindisi, arrived in Chicago twenty-eight years ago and began selling papers and blacking boots at Adams and State streets. He saw the possibilities of boot blacking among a well-to-do people, careless of its small change, and opened the first "parlor" at the board of trade. He began with two chairs and kept adding chairs until he had fifteen. Soon he opened a second place in the alley that used to open off Monroe street opposite the Inter Ocean. He still has two establishments, one of which is the largest in the city. His income is said to be \$15,000 a year, and he is reported to be worth \$100,000.

Pacell's success almost immediately revolutionized the "shoe-shining" business, and the passing of the itinerant bootblack began. Imitators established "parlors" by the score. But prices were kept up. Ten cents was the price for ordinary "shine," and a special polish cost 15 cents, down to seven years ago.

Athens, Greece, is possibly the dustiest city in the world, and it is said to have more bootblacks for its size than any other. Geocarlis was born in a village about 200 miles from Athens, and began life as a bootblack at the capital. The price of a "shine" in Athens is one-third of a cent—a fact that is of considerable importance to Chicago.

Geocarlis arrived in Chicago fourteen years ago and began blacking boots at Halsted and Madison streets. Within a year he had opened a "parlor" in an alley. The next year he opened two more. In two years more he was known as the "Boss of the West Side Bootblacks." His price was always 5 cents—a sum which looked large to him as compared with one-third of a cent. Therefore, for years the price of a shine was 10 cents down town and 5 cents on the West Side.

In 1897 Geocarlis invaded the downtown district by opening two 5-cent "parlors"—one at 75 Van Buren street and the other at Monroe and Clark streets. He secured so much trade that he had to open other places. Gradually he forced his competitors to come to 5 cents. Pacell held out for three years and then came down.

Meanwhile Geocarlis was becoming a "shoe-shining" magnet. He opened large establishments in Milwaukee, Detroit, St. Louis, Omaha, and Kansas City. Ten years after he landed at the Polk street depot with 3 cents in his pocket he was the proprietor of twenty-five parlors and the employer of 250 men and boys. His net income was said to be \$25,000.

Now he is a rich man with many business interests. You may see him drive up to his offices in Chicago's famous building at Halsted street and Blue Island avenue in an automobile any afternoon. There he dictates letters for an hour or so and then drives away again. He has a steamship agency, and handles insurance, real estate and brokerage. He is probably worth \$150,000, and retains only the general supervision of his various interests.

The "shoe-shining" business of a big city is quite an affair. In Chicago there are more than sixty "parlors" within the loop, and outside of it more than 400, to say nothing of the business of the barber shops. It is estimated that Chicagoans spend more than \$300,000 a year in having their shoes "shined." Of this \$100,000 represents the profits of the business, which includes many sides lines, such as the sale of insoles, laces and foot powder, and the cleaning of hats "while you wait."

Geocarlis had never been at school an hour in his life until he became a pupil in a Chicago night school. But he organized his business, systematized it, introduced many small economies, and expanded it in a way that would do credit to the most modern of our native born captains of industry.

Athens has taught the world many things. To these must be added the science of "shining" shoes.—Chicago Inter Ocean.

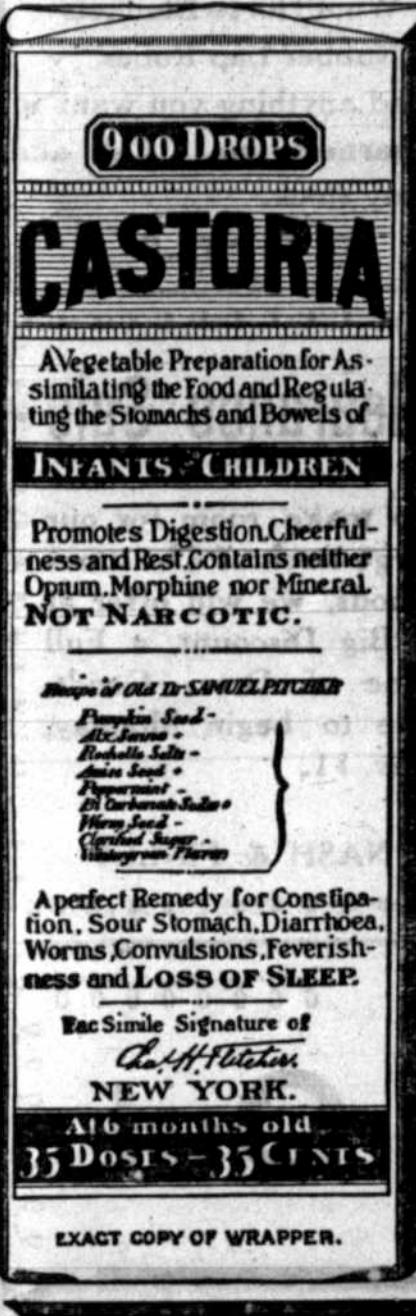
Vote or Settle.
