The advance of Oregon and the Pacific Northwest in live stock will be splendidly illustrated at the Horse Show in Portland on the 7th, 8th and 9th of this month. Entries have already surpassed expectations and a large attendance is anticipated.

In speaking of the financial crisis President Roosevelt says: "I doubt if my policies have had any material effect in bringing about the present trouble in Wall Street, but if they have it will not alter my policy in the least. All I did was to turn on the light, and I am not responsible for what the light showed."

A great deal of interest is being manifested in the Oregon State Good Roads convention to be held in Portland November 14th-15th. Hon. John H. Scott, of Salem, president of the state association, urges the appointment of delegates and asks for a large attendance. There will be present a number of able speakers who have given years to practical road-building. The county judges and county commissioners of Oregon are especially responsible for the success of this meeting and are urged to send delegates. The same is true with regard to commercial, industrial, agricultural and horticultural societies, reporting a list of same at once to President Scott, at Salem.

Checks "payable only through clearing house" get the money just the same as the old fashioned kind for all necessary purposes. This little hesitation in the stream of financial wealth, when Oregon is producing for the good year 1907 a lumber product of \$30,000,000, live stock and wool worth \$20,000,000, poultry and eggs worth \$3,000,000, a grain crop worth \$15,000,000, and a fruit crop of \$5,000,000, and erecting buildings worth \$20,000,000, seems just a little queer, and things will right themselves. Oregon banks have plenty of money, our people are out of debt, our mortgages are paid and a little cool judgement and optimism will bring us out all right.

The Myrtle Point Enterprise, in speaking of law enforcement in Portland, drops this timely remark: "On a recent date it was announced in bold headlines in a Portland paper that one of the prominent peace officers of that city would visit a certain resort to learn whether or not the laws were being violated. The succeeding issue stated that the judge had made the visit and found everything all correct and very orderly. The official might make even more certain the next time by not only announcing his purpose in the papers but by taking a brass band along and sending in his card so as not to make too sudden an appearance in the presence of the dive keeper."

The dinner in honor of Mr. M. J. Roche, recently elected president of the American association of Travelling Passenger Agents, at the Portland Commercial Club Saturday night, was attended by the officials of over twenty of the leading American railroads, the officials of the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition, and the governors of Oregon and Washington. Mr. Roche has attended for years, the national conventions of this association and has used every possible effort to advertise the resources of Oregon in every portion of the United

States. The passenger officials of the United States had much to do with the success of the Lewis and Clark exposition, and they will also be instrumental in making a success of the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition.
