In the discussion of the present financial situation the Oregonian on Tuesday contained a leading editorial under the head of "Just the plain way," which is well worth reading and then preserving for future reading. It is full of good reasoning and good sense.

The Martinsville, Indiana, Democrat says: "The late President Harrison once conducted a case before a justice of the peace near Waverly, for the defendant, who was charged with the malicious killing of a goose, for a fee of \$5. He afterwards conducted successfully an international case in which his fee was \$100,000. This state hasn't many other lawyers who run the scale as many octaves as that."

The Observer made a count of the population of Dallas and immediate suburbs recently and found 2090 people. This makes a very good showing for the county seat of Polk, but the further statement that childless homes to the number of 139 were found looks bad—very bad for a progressive little city like Dallas. Just wait until you hear from Newberg. In a count of our native born—that is where we shine.

It is highly commendable on the part of the people of Newberg that they are inclined to take a cheerful view of the financial situation and are going about business as usual without agitation of conditions. The people can create a panic if they want to at any time almost, but this is exactly what they don't want to do at this time, for there are few but who can well remember the dire results of panicky times and they don't want to see a repetition of them. "Keep cool" is the word and we are glad to note that this is the course our people are inclined to take.

The scare that was caused last week by the closing of the doors of the Title Guarantee & Trust Company, of Portland, was offset to a very large degree by the announcement made by Ladd & Tilton, that they would make good all savings deposits within two years, in case they were not paid by the Title Guarantee & Trust Co. On Tuesday the Merchants National bank of Port-

land failed to open its doors, but it is so well understood that the bank is solvent and that it will reopen again for business, that comparatively little flurry has been caused on account of it. The opinion is general that the worst is over and that business will rapidly settle down to normal conditions. The banks of Oregon were never in better condition and if the people do their part all will be well in a short time.

For the information of many inquirers we will state that the banks of Oregon and other Pacific Coast states were not alone in the financial stress that came suddenly, as the information was flashed over the wires from the great money centers, that no more currency could be sent out to the banks for the present. The writer was in Indiana at the time and fortunately had cashed a draft two days before which left him with enough money to purchase a ticket for home, else he might now be at the mercy of his friends in the "Hoosier" state. Immediately the bankers throughout the state held hasty consultation and entered into an agreement by which they only paid to depositors small amounts to keep business going. Three days later the writer landed in Kansas where he found conditions exactly the same. In both these states and while on the way home we heard the situation discussed by all classes of people and from many view points, and almost without exception the people accepted the conditions good naturedly and freely admitted that the plan adopted by the banks throughout the country was timely and further that it was the one thing that prevented a panic that would have paralyzed business for a long time to come. The banks in every state in the Union were faced by exactly the same conditions and in almost all cases practically the same policy was adopted. It is something new in the history of banking but the grave situation came like a flash, without previous announcement, and time has proven the wisdom of the course taken.

Death of J. D. Tarrant.

J. D. Tarrant died at his home in Newberg Sunday, November 10, after a lingering illness, at the age of seventy-six years, lacking eighteen days.

The deceased was born November 29, 1831, at Marlborough, England and came to the United States in March 1854. He was married to Mrs. Emma Smith February 1, 1850, and to them were born one son, E. C. Tarrant, who lives at Viewfield, South Dakota, and three daughters, Mrs. Emma Crawford who died at Goldendale, Washington, in 1889, Mrs. Nellie McCulley, of Newberg, and one dying in infancy.

In 1874 he associated himself with the Masonic order at Hamburg, Iowa, and on April 15, 1877, he joined the Reorganized church of Jesus Christ of the latter day Saints, remaining a true christian to the time of his death.

From Rochester, New York, Mr. Tarrant removed with his family to Nebraska in 1859, and to Oregon in 1884, locating at Newberg and purchasing the Ramsey flouring mill which he operated for a number of years. He was an honorable, upright citizen, a friend to everybody and was held in high esteem by all who knew him. Funeral services were conducted at the Friends church on Tuesday morning by Mrs. Edwards, while the services at the cemetery were conducted by the order to which he belonged.
