Duncan's hall on last Friday night was as cold as a barn and people in the audience sat with overcoats and wraps on and still were quite uncomfortable. Since a good round price is charged for the use of the hall, it should be sufficiently warmed and ventilated to make it comfortable for an audience, if the price of wood is high.

The development of the live stock interests has been very rapid in Oregon during the past ten years. Stock men have vied with each other in getting the best for breeding purposes, and the result is that a stock show in our state brings out a grade of show animals that would hold their own with the very best in any show ring in the country, east or west.

The Polk County Observer says: "A newspaper publisher receives all kinds of proposals to trade merchandise for advertising space, and if he is wise, accepts none of them. The latest to reach the Observer office is an offer to pay for advertising space in 'Bull Dog' suspenders. Nothing doing. The publisher of a paper filled with advertising of this class would soon find that he didn't need the suspenders—he would have plenty of time to hold up his trousers with his hands."

A number of times during the past two years the Graphic has suggested that the prudent man would lay something aside for a "rainy day" while work was plentiful and wages were good. Attention is not now called to it in a "we told you so spirit." It is a suggestion that is good to think about and teach to those who are starting out in life. Most boys and girls can be taught habits of industry and thrift, but for those who are brought up in town it is not so easy to teach them that in order to form the habit of saving their money they must learn to pass the candy shops and the catch penny amusement booths by and start savings accounts.

The fruit growers of the different sections of Oregon have had their inning at Portland and now comes the announcement that dairymen are to declare a two days holiday, December 12 and 13, and meet in a big convention in the Woodmen's hall at Eleventh and Alder, Portland. An exhibit of dairy products will be made and valuable prizes awarded. Papers will be read by experienced dairymen, followed by general discussion to bring out the strong points. Farmers and dairymen are urged to attend. The railroads have made a rate of a fare and a third from every point in the state.

The Portland Country Club and Live Stock Association, recognizing the importance of the development of the live stock interests of this state, have arranged for the greatest fair yet held west of the Missouri river, for 1908. There are \$40,000 in prizes, equalling those offered by the Louis and Clark exposition in 1905. To this will be added \$10,000 or \$12,000 by the different breeder's associations in attendance upon the International Live Stock Show at Chicago, November 30th to December 7th, where Mr. M. D. Wisdom will go as a special representative to arrange a date and to secure the presence here of the most famous herds in America.

Fruit growers were urged by the experiment stations and by county fruit inspectors to begin spraying for scale as soon as the fruit crop was removed from the trees, but so far as the Graphic has learned no spraying has been done this fall by the growers about Newberg. Many about town who have small orchards would have been glad to pay some one for spraying, but no one seems to be in the business. Big money was made last season on cherries by everybody who had trees but the scale is here and unless a war is effectually made on this pest this source of revenue will be cut off. Much valuable time has been lost already. It is time for growers to awaken to the situation.

The president of the Chicago Women's Clubs said at a recent meeting, "The whole system of giving Christmas presents is preposterous. Human society must eventually rid itself of an extravagance which has grown out of the celebration once beautiful and appropriate, but which has lost its significance and value." And she was not far wrong if wrong at all. When the giving of presents reaches the fad stage, or when it becomes a burden, as it does to many who appear to think they must keep up with their friends and neighbors, it is a bore and it is time for people to stop and do a little sensible thinking.

The little Milwaukie hamlet in Clackamas county is indeed in hard lines. The so called "clean" mayoralty candidate, A. J. Walker, in making his statement to the voters says: "I am not in favor of attempting to abolish the Milwaukie club at the present time, and in the face of a national panic as it now exists, which would mean the canceling of a major portion of our revenues, which would necessarily create more burden to the taxpayer. Hot air is all right in its place, and talk is cheap, but it takes money to make the mare go." At the mention of the Milwaukie club every decent man in Oregon holds his nose, and it will be unwise to loosen the grip if this man Walker is a fair type of their "clean" men nominated to fill the town offices.

W. R. Everest, who has always taken an interest in growing good fruit, remarked when in the Graphic office a few days ago that out in his neighborhood northwest of town, they were talking of organizing a company for the purpose of purchasing and operating a gasoline

spraying plant. He said they realized that a constant warfare must be made on the insect pests in order to get any adequate returns from their orchards and that a well equipped spraying outfit was needed in their community. This is the correct view to take of the matter and it is to be earnestly hoped that a number of good spraying outfits will be operated in the fruit districts about Newberg before another crop of fruit sets on the trees. Good orcharding like good farming may be made to pay, but the grower who is unwilling to pay the price may as well retire from the field. The San Jose scale will in a very short time retire him whether he wills to go or not. This is a forgone conclusion.

We hope those who have charge of the halls in town where public entertainments are held, will carefully read the following suggestions made by "The Lyceumite," and not only read them but see that they are observed: "Will the committeemen give ear while we suggest that they need to instruct their janitors? Let the janitor understand that he is to air the building after the last entertainment. Do not allow him to heat the shut up, left over foul air. He won't take the trouble unless you dock him, or stand over him while he does it. Many lectures and entertainments are not appreciated, but the effect of bad air on the audience and on the speaker is often responsible for the failure rather than the lack of ability on the part of the speaker. Don't spoil a hundred dollar lecture by employing a one dollar janitor. Get a janitor who knows his job. Make him keep the lights in order. Make him heat the building comfortable. Don't allow him too many assistant janitors. A dozen cigarette-smoking, town loafers are not needed to shift the scenery for a lecture."

There is life, vim and vigor in the makeup of every healthy boy and young man that makes them want to be up and doing something during every hour of the day and night when they are not asleep. It is nature doing its proper work and sensible people would not have it otherwise if they could. The one duty that is laid upon those of more mature years is to see that this reserve force, during the formative period, is directed along proper and well guarded lines. The Y. M. C. A. is one of the best organized forces doing such work for boys and young men and it speaks well for Yamhill county that a county organization has been formed, with local associations for the various towns throughout the county. The announcement is made elsewhere that the Bristow building on First street is to be fitted up for the Newberg association. It now behooves our citizens to give the movement hearty support and much good is sure to result from it. A little time and money spent in an effort to give the boys a chance will never be lost.
