IT WON'T STAY BURIED.

Senator Bourne is conceded to be a pretty shrewd politician, but in ordering shipments of Oregon fruits for his Washington friends he will do well to remember that there are several localities in the state that produce big red apples. Hint No. 1.—Newberg Graphic.

The senator is shrewd enough to know where he can get the best apples, and gets them at Hood River. If he wanted the best cream pressed brick he would go to Newberg. He would not come to Hood River for them, neither would he go to Newberg for the best apples. He could get good brick at Hood River and good apples at Newberg, but when he wants the "best" Oregon products to show his Washington friends, he goes to the locality where the "best" is produced.—Glacier.

There goes that hatchet again, which was reported to have been buried at the Portland apple show, held only a few short weeks ago. It is evident that the handle was left very near the surface by the mourners.

As for Newberg, our people are turning their attention largely to other industries and we have never claimed to be in it with other districts that are making apple growing a business. Our good friend Moe of the Glacier must bear with us however, when we say that we have eaten better apples grown right here at Newberg, than we found at Hood River while attending one of their excellent apple fairs.

The editor of the Oregon Agriculturist, who can be depended upon for a fair statement of facts has this to say of the recent apple show in Portland:

"Oregon apples have been well advertised in Portland in the past two weeks. Special displays have been made by the Willamette Valley, Hood River and Coos county. In beauty these displays have never been surpassed. The Willamette Valley exhibit was a revelation to a multitude of people who never knew that such fine apples could be grown in this valley or had held the erroneous but common opinion that it is no longer possible to raise in this valley apples as fine as were grown in the early days. The exhibit from Hood River was the most beautiful and artistic display it has ever made and nothing can be said in its praise which is stronger than this. There is no occasion to compare the merits of the two exhibits. Every citizen of Oregon might well be proud of either and both of them, and the handsome display from Coos county gave additional evidence of Oregon's capacity to produce apples of the greatest beauty and the highest merit."

THE RIGHT RING TO IT.

Our friend, Timothy Brownhill of the Beaver State Herald, says some of his readers have been heard to remark that the Herald is too radical along some lines, and then he adds a few very plain statements, from which we cull the following:

"People read the Herald because it has something to say and isn't afraid to say it. And this very policy has, of course, made it enemies. That was to be expected. The paper or the man that is aggressive has enemies. The paper or the man that has no enemies is a namby-pamby putty kind of paper or individual that is commonly called neutral, tends to his own business, is afraid to speak out for fear of hurting somebody's feelings or, as is more often the case, for fear of losing a few cents

in trade. The Herald isn't that kind and does not propose to be.

The editor of the Herald is not publishing the paper for fun, that is true. Neither is he publishing it just for the money there is in it. But he is trying, in perhaps a weak, humble way, to do all the good he can; to make life brighter and better for the masses; to help men and women to a higher sense of duty; to help to save our state and nation from the hands of the grafter; to reduce temptation and evil and in their stead, to make it possible for the young man and woman to grow up with a higher sense of honor before them and their duty to the state made plain."

Timothy, you are made of the right kind of stuff. May the country produce more of your kind. We would not entirely agree with the man, who, when bubbling over with patriotic sentiment, exclaimed, "My country, right or wrong!" but give us the man every day in the week who has convictions and who has the back bone to let them be known, even though he may make mistakes occasionally. The putty men, the fellows whose only visible means of support is a string of cartilage along the spinal column, are all out of proportion in numbers to the fellows who are blessed with real backbone. Consequently it is little wonder that many so called editorial chairs are being warmed by men who are recruited from the ranks of the former class, but it is refreshing to pick up an exchange that is fathered by a man who has something to say and who says it.

It is also a pleasure to line up with people, who, in church, educational and business matters, come to the front and express their opinions freely and fearlessly rather than to set back without voicing a single sentiment and then with the first opportunity and under cover growl at those who have the moral stamina to speak out and let the public know where they stand, and say they are "trying to run things."

Give us more Timothy Brownhills and fewer putty men.

The editor of the Newberg Graphic visited his old home in Indiana this year and paw paws tasted so good that he is promising his friends a chance to indulge in the luxury of Oregon-grown pawpaws in a few years. For his benefit we call attention to the fact that he may have to hand-pollinate the blossoms on those trees to make his promise good. Near the Michigan Experiment Station there are some pawpaw trees which have never born fruit. This year one of the professors hand-pollinated some of the blossoms, and well developed fruit was thus obtained. It is supposed that the kind of insects which do the pollinating do not exist in Michigan and very likely they are not in Oregon.—Oregon Agriculturist.

Thanks for the information. A. R. Mills of Springbrook, informs the Graphic that a gentleman from the Rogue River country made the statement at a horticultural meeting in Portland, that pawpaws were being grown successfully in that valley. Can any of our readers give information from personal knowledge, of successful pawpaw growing in Oregon?

Any sort of a numbskull with muscle and a little practice can cut a tree down, but it requires a degree of intelligence to successfully grow a tree and make it produce fruit of a high grade. The Oregon Agriculturist well says: "There is no other branch of agriculture in which brains and methods count for as much as in fruit growing, and wherever a community is found which is making a success of fruit growing it will be found that the fruit growers are gaining in ability and in influence as well as in prosperity."

A clipping from the Oregonian under the head of "Money Flowing West" is well worth reading. It covers the ground of the pres-

ent financial stringency in a few words and makes predictions for the early future that will be read with interest.

All the extra session talk is off and it is well. No more thank you for the present.

Money Flowing West.

One of the certain results of the present financial stringency will be a superabundance of money on the Pacific Coast. It was, in fact, a surplus of money that brought the Western banks into a condition which made them victims of the Wall street panic. Everybody on the Coast had money and there were too few borrowers in this part of the country. The banks loaned their money and depositors' money in the East, and when the depositors took a notion that they wanted it, not all of it could be had on short notice. But the banks are gradually getting it back again and eventually it will all be on the Coast again, increased by the returns from this year's crops. Then confidence will be completely restored and there will be more money than people will know what to do with. More than this, most of what the Coast has to sell is in the form of necessities, while much of what it buys in the East is in the form of luxuries. This financial stringency has made the people more cautious, and they will be careful about spending money. The purchase of necessities will go on just the same as usual, but there will be a decrease in the purchase of luxuries. This will be to the advantage of the Coast and keep more money at home.

There are a great many people in Oregon who have been predicting a shrinkage in values, particularly real estate values, as a result of the money stringency, but they are doomed to disappointment. We shall see a repetition of the experience of 1905. It was then said, "Wait until after the Lewis and Clark fair and there will be a slump in values and you can pick up property for a song." But the slump did not come, for the reason that everybody wanted to buy real estate. People who have been gradually drawing their money out of the banks or who wish to do so will be hunting for an investment in the next few months. The banks will have more money than they can loan and they will hesitate about sending it East again. In the absence of a better subject of investment there will be a strong demand for real property. If the Coast were a debtor part of the country and labored under the necessity of sending money East, the situation would be much different, but it is clear to every one that we shall have more money three months from now, and six months from now, than ever before. Wall-street panics may come and go and in the passing may cause some temporary inconvenience in the productive and developing West, but they will not materially affect legitimate real estate investments on the Pacific Coast.—Oregonian.
