For years the Graphic stood almost alone among Oregon newspapers in opposition to saloons but of late it is having a good deal of company. Even the big Portland dailies are beginning to say some fairly sensible things on the saloon question and many politicians are making predictions of a cleaning out of the whole business in Oregon at no distant day, all of which sounds good to a pioneer in the war of extermination.

Monday being the first day of the "open season" for scared bank depositors, there was naturally some curiosity felt regarding the action of the people, but here in Newberg there were if any difference fewer people about the banks than usual on Monday and all through the week the business at the banks has been normal and people are going about business as usual. There was no lost confidence in Newberg and consequently there was none to be "restored."

A Yamhill county newspaper man was heard to make the statement recently that he worked in opposition to the Local Option law and voted against it, but that if it was to be voted on again in Oregon he would work for it and vote for it. This is only one of hundreds of instances that might be cited to show that sentiment is changing rapidly throughout the country regarding the saloon business. This man stated that he had been convinced by personal observation that a county voted dry under our Local Option law meant prohibition and that was good enough for him.

The city of Ashland has been so equally divided in sentiment on the question of the granting of saloon licenses that with each annual municipal election the whole question is fought over. Both sides have won at different times and Ashland has seen much of an up and down life on the saloon question. At the recent election the dry element carried the election by about one hundred majority and this has given the temperance forces such encouragement that they are now arming themselves for a war that is to be waged to vote the whole county of Jackson dry at the June election.

When a woman suffrage agitator goes about the country wearing a man's hat and has a general "manish" bearing in her actions and conversation, her work fails to appeal to a large number of voters, who, nominally would favor granting women the right of suffrage. The womanly woman has a place in the home and in society that can't be and never will be filled by the female, who, in her zeal for public work of any kind, loses her modesty. In this class will probably be found some who will want to pull the hair of the editor on account of what is expressed in these few words.

In the field of newspaperdom in Oregon there are a lot of fellows who will fill their columns week after week with announcements of fruit growers meetings, dairy meetings, agricultural association meetings and all kinds of gatherings of like character, and urge the people through their editorial columns to leave their work and attend in order to meet their fellows, exchange ideas, listen to well prepared papers and in this way the better prepare themselves for the work they are engaged in. This is all very well but let it be announced that a meeting of the newspaper men of the state is to be held for a like purpose and they pooh-pooh the idea and say they have no time to spend in this way. "The State Association don't amount to anything anyway" so they say. Well if it don't, who is there to blame for it but the newspaper men themselves? And are we going to admit that the newspaper men of Oregon are less capable of holding successful conventions than the goat breeders or the cow punchers of the state? The issue is being put squarely before the newspaper fraternity and more will follow between the present date and January 17-18 when the meeting of the association will be held. We are glad to note some progress and we hope to see a general rattling of the dry bones all along the line before the date of the meeting.

The Basketball Game.

A fairly good sized crowd gathered at the college gym on last Friday night to witness the game of basketball between the home team and the McMinnville College team, and everybody went away feeling that they had been given the worth of their money. The visitors came down to even up an old score, as they had previously stated, and it looked for a time like they were going to make good.
