WAR ON THE OLD ORCHARDS.

Apple-Growers Propose Severe
Measures for Their Own
Benefit.

La Fayette, December 12.—(To
the editor.—An impression seems
to be current that our old friend,
the Oregon apple war is ended,
and that cessation of hostilities
was one of the results of the re-
sults of the apple fair of last
month. Not so. The war has
just begun. A few skirmishes
have been fought out but the
real battle is yet to come. True,
the gouging out of eyes has been
eliminated, but there will always
be a friendly rivalry between
Hood River and the Willamette
Valley which must lead to in-
creased energy at least among
the ranks of the Valley apple-
growers. A temporary success
is nothing. We have much to
do, many lessons to learn, before
we are securely fortified in our
position. A vigorous campaign
in many directions has already
been outlined by the officers of
the Apple-grower's Association,
the details of which will be taken
up at an approaching meeting of
the association.

Every apple-grower in the Val-
ley should attend the convention
of the State Horticultural Soci-
ety in January, for at that time
our association will hold an ad-
joined meeting for the purpose
of inaugurating the new lines of
work determined upon, including
preparations for establishing a
uniform pack for our fruit and
for the general conduct of our
association. Plans will also be
perfected for a systematic attack
on the old orchards of the valley.
These orchards are universally
admitted to be public nuisances,
and are such menace to our busi-
ness and to our large invest-
ments that our newly affirmed
fame will be jeopardized unless
these nuisances be abated. These
orchards must be attended to.
There shall be no more dallying
with a sickly sentiment to pre-
serve them. We have waited
and prated long enough and we
propose to act a little now.
These orchards can be cut down
and allowed to grow a year and
then be top-grafted with Yellow
Newtowns and become profit-
able, where now they are plague-
spots, worse than useless. The
Yellow Newtown, which is a
slow grower in our valley, needs
the sturdy root system of our
old orchards to push it along
into a rapid growth. In this
way these old orchards instead
of being menaces to the fruit in-
dustry of the state will add im-
mensely to our output and will
increase at once the value of
the farms whereon they stand.
These trees should all be cut
down between December 15 and
March 1 and inspectors in the
several counties will be called
upon to take the matter in hand
