January, 1908—A happy New Year and may prosperity attend the efforts of our large family of readers throughout the whole year.

Since leap-year is now here the wives of delinquent subscribers will be given the same consideration that is extended to the men folks when they come in to pay up—and no questions asked.

The New Year number of the Oregonian, while not as bulky as some former editions gotten out by that splendid purveyor of news, is really a first class number, as it covers the ground in an attractive, concise way that will appeal to those who are seeking information about the great new Northwest. It ought to be widely circulated.

Mary Ramsey Wood died at the home of her daughter in Hillsboro on New Year's morning at the age of 120 years. The deceased was born at Knoxville, Tennessee, May 20, 1787. During her early married life she lived in Alabama, Georgia and Missouri and in 1852 she crossed the plains to Oregon, riding the entire distance on horseback on a mare she christened Martha Washington Pioneer.

The officers of the Oregon Press Association are endeavoring to see that every newspaper man in the state gets not only one, but a dozen or more reminders that a meeting of the association is to be held in Portland, January 17-18, and that all are given a cordial invitation to attend. Justice can't be done to the advertiser or the newspaper, when cold type must be thrown together at the last minute, but there is some comfort in being able to point to the fact that the readers in the home know what is being said in the advertising pages of the local paper.

The publishers of the North Pacific Rural Spirit have good reason to be proud of the special Christmas edition issued by them last week. The front cover page shows a model head, neck and shoulders of a horse, a well groomed lady carrying a bouquet of Oregon roses, and baring the fact that the designer did not have "gumption" enough to write "Christmas" in the lower corner in place of "Xmas" as he has it, he made a happy hit. From "kiver to kiver" the edition is full of good stuff, among which are a number of well written articles by competent writers, covering a large

list of subjects that are of vital interest to the producers of the great Northwest. One article of much merit is a paper by Miss Laura Rose, a sister of Mrs. R. W. Harrold of Newberg, who is a teacher of Domestic Science in the Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph, Ontario, Canada. Her subject is "To the husband of the isolated woman on the farm."

To the editor:
Will you kindly allow me a brief space for reply to an editorial criticism about a certain woman "wearing a man's hat" etc. which appeared in your valuable paper of December 19.

We all know that "a womanly woman" has, or ought to have, a place in the home, but we also know that it is not equal rights but the lack of them that creates the occasional "mannish" woman to whom men object, though not more strenuously than women to an occasional "womanish" man.

When a capable girl, early in her teens and inexperienced becomes the wife of an inefficient man who deprives her of a home except as she goes out and rolls logs, slashes brush, milks cows and peddles milk, butter and eggs to keep the wolf from the door, she naturally loses the refinement of which she was a promising specimen in her youth. And when such a woman learns in her maturer years, the fact that the deprivations of women like herself can only be cured through the law-making power of womans ballot, we should all honor her for her frankness and courage in going out to seek it, just as we now honor Lewis and Clark, Sacajawea or Ezra Meeker whose endurance and daring opened the way for the higher civilization of the future, though their experience furrowed their faces, shortened or roughened their voices and whitened their hair. No Mr. editor, no woman "in this class" or any other, will want to "pull your hair." But we all respectfully await the affirmative vote of every honorable man at the coming June election, because we know equal rights once gained for women by the chivalry and courtesy of their justice loving fathers, husbands, brothers, and sons, the mission of the "mannish woman agitator," of which the disparagement of our sex shows now and then the fruit, will find her occupation gone.

The editorial to which Mrs. Duniway refers follows:
When a woman suffrage agitator goes about the country wearing a man's hat and has a general "mannish" bearing in her actions and conversation, her work fails to appeal to a large number of voters, who, nominally would favor granting women the right of suffrage. The womanly woman has a place in the home and in society that can't be and never will be filled by the female, who, in her zeal for public work of any kind, loses her modesty. The editor of the Graphic fails to see how "equal rights," in the absence of proper parental guidance and restraint, is going to prevent girls, "early in their teens and inexperienced" from becoming the wives of "inefficient men," nor how it will prevent boys under like conditions, from becoming the husbands of "inefficient" women. And after the bad bargain has been entered into, he fails to see how "deprivations" that may follow the unwise step are to be "cured through the law-making power of womans ballot."
