



### Cannery Meeting.

On Saturday afternoon at 1:30 o'clock a meeting will be held at Duncan's hall when J. B. Moran, the superintendent of the Weber-Bussell canning plants, will be present and give a talk for the benefit of the producers who are interested in knowing what will be wanted for the new cannery that will be opened at Newberg this season.

This will be an opportunity that none can afford to let go by and a large attendance will be expected. For years there has been a demand on the part of the people for a cannery at Newberg and since the Weber-Bussell people have shown their faith in Newberg and Chehalem valley by putting their good money in here and establishing one of the largest plants in the Northwest, it behooves the producers to get in and back up the proposition by hearty co-operation in the way of getting ready to furnish the stuff the cannery must have to operate on.

With so large a plant it is difficult for the uninitiated to conceive of the great amount of fruits, berries and vegetables that will be swallowed up in tins during the run of a season, and just what it will mean to Newberg and the surrounding territory when it is backed up with the necessary amount of stuff to keep it going during a full season's run. It is not enough to know that the plant is here. It must operate in order to bring results for the men who have invested their money in it, and in order to be able to operate, the necessary amount of perishable stuff from the garden, the orchard and the farm must be forthcoming year by year, and the owners of these holdings are the ones who must necessarily be most interested in the meeting to be held Saturday.

Of course business men and all classes will be represented for all are interested in this great industry. The ladies are interested and they will be expected to be on hand. Make of yourself a committee of one to invite your neighbors and help to make this one of the largest and most enthusiastic meetings ever held in Newberg.

The Weber-Bussell people have said they think our people don't realize what the cannery means for Newberg. Let us show them at the Saturday meeting that we are willing listeners at least.

### The Farmer and Nation.

There is but one person whose welfare is as vital to the welfare of the whole country as is that of the wage-worker who does manual labor; and that is the tiller of the soil—the farmer. If there is one lesson taught by history it is that the permanent greatness of any state must ultimately depend more upon the character of its country population than upon anything else. No growth of cities, no growth of wealth, can make up for a loss in either number or character of the farming population. In the United States more than in almost any other country we should realize this and should prize our country population. When this nation began its independent existence it was a nation of farmers. The towns were small and for the most part were seacoast trading and fishing ports. The chief industry of the country was agriculture, and the ordinary citizen was in some way connected with it. In every great crisis of the past a peculiar independence has had to be placed upon the farming population, and this independence has

hitherto been justified. But it can not be justified in the future if agriculture is permitted to sink in the scale as compared with other employments. We can not afford to lose that pre-eminently typical American, the farmer who owns his own farm. President Roosevelt.

The exhibit already exceeds, in promises, that made last year, so that it is important that exhibitors file their request for space at an early date with J. H. Reid, Milwaukee.

It is not every year that we have an opportunity of having our products passed upon by a national expert. The occasion ought to be one of great value to our growers. Bring or send your unknown, or new varieties as well, so that they may be named.

Mr. Deach asked if that included the school and Mr. Schaad answered that school would commence one week from Monday unless further notice should be given.

This seemed to rile a few who called a hasty meeting, took their belongings from the building and phoned to Mr. Schaad they had no further use for the house, announcing that their meetings would be held at their homes.

The local referring to this matter which appeared last week was based entirely on information obtained from a Newberg contractor who stated that he was figuring on building a new church at Rex as the school house had been closed against the church. When L. S. Otis was soliciting for funds for building the church he said nothing about the matter of the school house being closed against them, only

as he was questioned and he then dismissed it with the fewest words possible and without making any charges. This much in justice to him.

The writer of the above says the statement regarding the closing of the schoolhouse "seems to be entirely without foundation," while the interested parties evidently thought that such an order had been made and they still seem to be of that opinion.
