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The Ladies' Home Journal and Osteopathy.

Years ago Editor Bok declared that "Osteopathy was all right if the osteopath was all right," (meaning it is important that the services of a legitimate osteopath is secured, and not a pretender, or a three-months-mail-course-osteopath.) Have known some wise women and even men, who had been treated a few times to conclude that "We can do that," and it all ends in their little boy or girl finding a home in the insane asylum from their wise(?) efforts.

The present number, January, 1908, of The Ladies' Home Journal contains an article by Dr. A. T. Still, Kirksville, Missouri, on "How I Came To Originate Osteopathy" with an explanatory "editor's note."

Previous to this, Edward W. Bok, the editor, in an address December 7, before the Philadelphia branch of the American Pharmaceutical Association, at the Philadelphia College of Physicians and Surgeons, declared that thousands of persons are being driven from allopathy to osteopathy because of ignorant prescribing and the use of nostrums by eminent physicians of that city.

"In my circle of friends within a year," Mr. Bok said, "fourteen families have turned to the drugless method of treatment, and when I ask them why, they declare that they cannot take the chances with prescription because, they say, 'the doctors don't know.'"

He vigorously arraigned physicians for prescribing nostrums when ignorant of their ingredients and therapeutic effect. "Leaders of the profession are the chief offenders" he declared. He said much more in the nature of a severe arraignment and Dr. John H. Musser, Dr. John B. Roberts, Dr. Henry W. Cattell, Dr. H. C. Woods Jr., Dr. James L. Andrews and Dr. D. L. Etzel, of the University of Pennsylvania highly commended him, and only Prof. Joseph P. Remington, Prof. Etzel of the University and Frank E. Morgan took exception to the arraignment by Mr. Bok.

Such growth of osteopathy is by no means confined to that city, or the other eastern cities, it is just as patent in all the States of this Union as it is there. And that isn't all—it will continue to grow by leaps and bounds. None of its growth has been by accident. It is because of its foundation principles and the public's increasing knowledge of its power for good. "Truth is mighty and must prevail."
