For Better Fruit.

A movement has been inaugurated throughout the whole of the Willamette Valley for the renovation of the old apple orchards without in any manner injuring the trees and for the purpose of making them profitable as well as healthy. This movement is in line with the earnest effort of Mr. M. O. Lowndale of this county to re-establish the reputation of the Willamette Valley apple. This movement has the backing of the Experiment Station at Corvallis and of the State Board of Horticulture and will be actively pushed by them.

The plan which was suggested by Mr. Lowndale, is to cut the old apple trees down to the ground or within two feet of the ground and allow them to sprout out and grow a year and then top-graft with Yellow Newtowns. If the tree trunks are sound they may be grafted in the latter part of April of this year by cutting a slit through the bark as is done in budding. These slits should be just where the limbs are wanted and should all be from six to twelve inches below the point where the tree is sawed off. Then scions shaved rather long and thin may be slipped through the slit and under the bark as if a bud were being inserted. About two buds should be left on the outside of the scion and the corner of each lip of the bark trimmed so it will fit close around the scion. The bark lips are then tied down by a string around the tree trunk and the wound well waxed particularly behind the scion. When the grafts have grown about eight inches the terminals should be pinched off to make them set firmer and to prevent them from being blown out by the winds of mid-summer. The trees should be cut down with a cross-cut saw and care should be taken not to split the remainder of the stump nor loosen its bark.

In three or four years these old trees will commence to bear again and there will be so many of them producing Yellow Newtowns that the whole valley will be a big Yellow Newtown orchard and its output will be handled by the Apple Growers' Association that has already been formed. There is no danger of overproduction of this variety of apples as there is a great market for them in England and all the old trees of the valley which are now of no value will become at once of great consequence to the farmer. He will always be able to sell his output where now he is unable to give it away. It is impossible to thoroughly spray these old trees now but by getting them close to the ground every farmer in Oregon could easily take care of his orchard and make it the most profitable property on his farm.

These suggestions are published at the request of the State Board of Horticulture and of the Willamette Valley Apple Growers' Association.
