Under the working of an efficient local option law Oregon is making a good record for ridding the state of saloons, but in one particular we are behind many of the other states. We still tolerate the cigarette. Here is an opportunity for some man to make a record and we hope to see men elected to the legislature from Yamhill county who will make a fight to a finish against the little stinker.

Mayor Johns, of Baker City, indicated recently that he was ready to see that the laws against gambling and other vices were enforced when the people made it plain to him that they desired him to take such action. Mayor Johns has had aspirations in the past to become governor of Oregon and it is likely that he will seek this high office at the hands of the people again, but it is safe to say the voters will prefer to elect a man who does his sworn duty as an official without waiting to be pressed to act by the people. This is a day when there is a demand for men for official positions who will acquaint themselves with the laws of the land, and, knowing their duty do it like men without hesitancy or equivocation. Instead of waiting for demands to be made by an indignant constituency an officer of the law should hasten to do his sworn duty and exhibit proper moral stamina instead of moral cowardice.

At a recent gathering in Newberg a gentleman present sized up the crowd and counted twenty-one men who were smokers and twenty-seven who were not smokers, and it was a representative gathering of the business men of our town. From the standpoint of one who does not smoke except as he is compelled to take it second handed, this is a fairly good showing, though it might be made better it is safe to say, without doing injury to anybody. In Portland it is getting to be quite a common thing to see men light their cigars or cigarettes in restaurants and smoke in the presence of ladies, which is only another evidence of the fact that the sensibilities of the average smoker, in time becomes so dulled that his smoking in public places imposes great discomfort on many people who are forced to visit the same places he visits and breathe the same tobacco fumes that come through his mouth and nose. All smokers are not entirely unmindful of the rights of others, but the unthinking class is already so large, and in most places is increasing at such a rate, that the man who will invent a smoke extinguisher and see that it is attached to all such who run at large will endear himself to a long suffering public.

If we mistake not the Oregonian was one of the first papers in the state to advocate a direct primary law and to make due apologies for seeming discrepancies in such a law that was tried in some of the states several years ago, but the editor of the big daily is now at such white heat in opposition to the initiative feature of our direct primary law that he is advising voters to vote against every one of the fifteen measures that are to be passed upon by the voters at the coming election. Senator Fulton stated in the presence of the writer a few years ago that he had pointed out to Mr. Scott his mistake

in advocating the primary law, and yet in a short time afterward Mr. Fulton stood up at a big political love feast in Portland and told how he stood in for the direct primary law, all of which goes to show how great men will change front on great questions. The editor of the Graphic does not presume to put himself in the class named above, but he will venture to predict that while our direct primary law may have some defects that need correcting, it has come to stay, since it is in the main approved by the masses among voters and they are not going to be stampeded by the simple cry of "wolf."

It is now up to the voter to make a study of the "single tax" theory between this and the coming June election, since the proposed amendment to the Constitution drafted by the Oregon Tax Reform Association will be on the ballot. The association has filed its proposed amendment, having several thousand more names signed than is required by law, so it is claimed. It is a big question and will require study and careful thought if one desires to vote intelligently on it. The main feature seems to be an effort to discourage land monopoly by taxing land values and franchises more and exempting improvements and personal property. To give our readers some idea of the radical changes proposed we quote the following words from the proposed amendment: "All dwelling houses, barns, sheds, outhouses and all other appurtenances thereto, all machinery and buildings used exclusively for manufacturing purposes, all fences, farm machinery and appliances used as such, all fruit trees, vines, shrubs and all other improvements on farms, all livestock, household furniture in use, and all workmen's tools." These are some of the things that it is proposed to exempt from taxation, and we call the attention of our readers to the importance of the measure this early in the campaign, in order that they may begin to investigate and post themselves before election day comes round.

In his speech at the banquet at the Imperial hotel on last Saturday night Tom Richardson stated that since Newberg had made good in the past in the way of dividing land up and making small holdings worth while, and also in taking the lead of all towns in the valley in locating manufacturing industries, he advised our people to continue along the same lines, pointing out the fact that it gave profitable labor to a rapidly growing population. The point was well taken. We have succeeded well along these lines in the past and there should be no lessening of endeavor now and in the future. The Willamette valley is going to be a thickly populated district in the future and we can easily keep to the front in securing profitable industries if we will pull together as a community, and stand ready to reach out after the numerous small industries that will surely come within our reach within the next few years. It is much easier for a town that has shown vim and vigor in the past to interest men who are looking for locations for investment, than it is for a sleepy old moss covered village to enlist such interest, and it stands every man, in and about Newberg, in hand to see that we keep well to the front in the former class.

**For Rural Patrons.**

Postmasters desire to call attention to the practice of some patrons of rural delivery of placing loose coins in their boxes each time they desire to dispatch letters instead of supplying themselves with postage in advance of their needs.

This practice imposes undue hardship on rural carriers in removing loose coins from boxes

and delays them on the service of their routes.

The postmasters therefore, urgently request that patrons of rural delivery provide themselves and keep on hand a supply of stamps consistent with and in advance of their needs. It is also very desirable that rural patrons place in their mail boxes small detachable cups of wood or tin in which to place coins, when necessary, in purchasing supplies of stamps.
