Obituary.

Joseph D. Fell died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. L. E. Brower in Newberg, February 4, 1908. The deceased was born near Columbia, Warren county, New York, November 1, 1832. At the age of twenty-one he went to Wisconsin where he worked on the early surveys of that region. On July 11, 1859, he was united in marriage to Miss Jane Christie, at Portage, Wisconsin, and to this union were born five children, four of whom survive him. The oldest daughter Jessie died November 5, 1874. Those living are Marion A. Fell of Gardner, Iowa, Nellie L. of Newberg, Bernice J. wife of Ned O'Neill of Clear Lake, Iowa, and Edith M. wife of L. E. Brower of Newberg, with whom he had made his home since coming to Oregon in 1906. He removed from Wisconsin to Hancock county, Iowa, in the spring of 1875, where his wife died December 17, 1888. Deceased was a member of the United Presbyterian church of Garner, Iowa. Funeral services were conducted at the Hollingsworth funeral parlors on Thursday morning.
