Since mention was made in last week's issue of certain published statements regarding charges made by Charlie Mitchell to the effect that O. V. Hurt was preparing to head the Holy Rollers in Seattle, it is due Mr. Hurt that the following statement made by him through the Oregonian be published. He writes from Waldport, Ore., as follows:

With reference to the news report and the Mitchell letter that I am reorganizing the Creffield religious sect, such report is incorrect. I feel as if I ought to say something at this time to satisfy a gossiping public. But the Creffield religion is a thing of the past and has been since his death. Myself and family are now living at Waldport, Ore., where we invite anyone to come or write to anyone here, if such inquirers are interested enough to know what we are doing. My life is open and nothing is hid. As to my son anyone can find him at his home in Seattle, where he held a position in the Bon Marche until within the last month, when he resigned to take an appointment as Deputy Assessor of Kings County. I could say a great deal about Mr. Mitchell, but it would do no good. I will just say he was in Seattle at the time George Mitchell was on trial. If he had had any evidence such as he now claims, he ought to have said so at that time.

Now, as the Oregonian has always been fair with me in my misfortunes in the past, I hope before any more is published about me that my side may be heard. This closes anything further from me, no matter what may be heralded through the press.

Big Reception at the College.

On Thursday night of last week a reception was tendered President and Mrs. W. I. Kelsey in the college chapel, which was largely attended by the residents of Newberg and others in the community.

The halls leading to the chapel were profusely decorated with the stars and stripes and here the guests were presented to Mr. and Mrs. Kelsey before passing into the chapel. When all had gathered a short program was given.

After a few preliminary remarks by B. C. Miles, president of the board, Jesse Edwards gave a short talk, outlining something of the work being done on the Pacific Coast by educational institutions under the direction of the Friends church and giving in some detail what the colleges stand for.

C. J. Edwards, a member of the first class to graduate from the college, spoke for the alumni, now numbering nearly one hundred, and gave the occupations that were being followed by the different members. In speaking of the good work Pacific College has been doing for the students he had a very encouraging word for the future of the institution.

President Kelsey gave a very interesting account of his work done during the early part of the year in soliciting for the endowment, and while he stated that the work was cut off when it was just well begun, by the sudden change in the financial situation, he found many warm friends of the college who have given assistance in the past and who indicated a willingness to subscribe to the endowment fund a little later. He was kindly received at all the points he visited and he feels hopeful for good results as soon as business gets back to normal conditions.

Music for the occasion was furnished by Prof. Carrick and E. A. Newby and by the Misses Gregory.

At the close of the exercises all were invited to the library where some light refreshments were served.

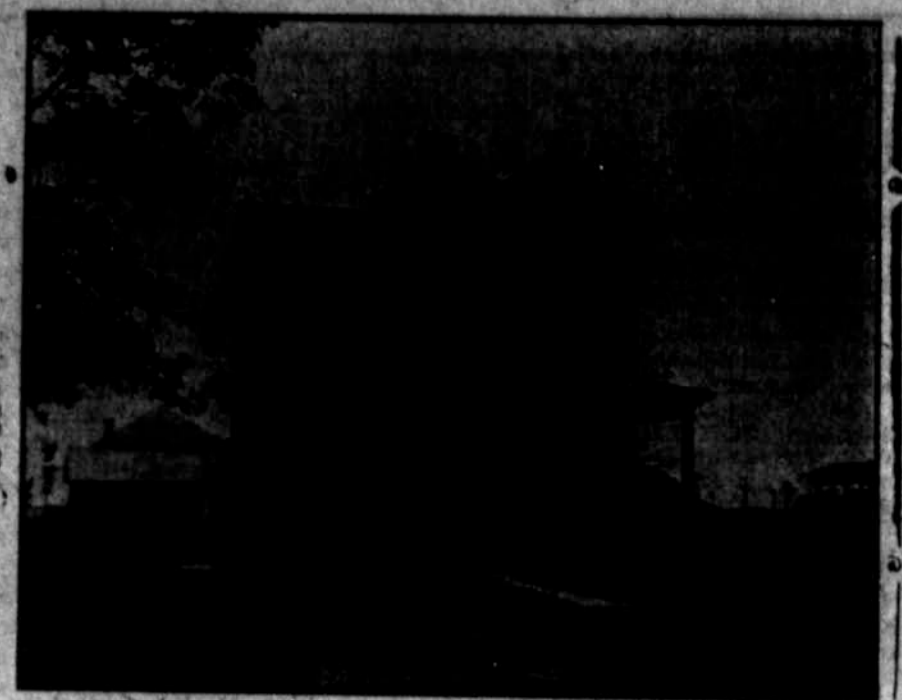
