Real estate about Newberg is better property to tie to than a gold mine. It is a sure thing and not merely a prospect.

The wholesale liquor dealers started in recently to reform the saloon keepers. Wrong again. They didn't start in high enough up.

The sale of small tracts in the vicinity of Newberg has never been better than it has been this spring and prices continue to crawl up all the time.

In the Illinois election held Tuesday twenty counties were voted dry which will put 1500 saloons out of commission. And the good work goes on.

Thomas E. Watson, of Georgia, and Sam H. Williams, of Indiana, nominees of the populist party for president and vice-president respectively, are early in the field.

Taft is certainly making a great race for a heavy weight. If it must be a choice between Taft and Bryan what will the harvest be for the big corporations.

State and county elections held once in four years would give the people just as good service from the officials elected, with a great saving in costs over the present system of holding elections every two years.

There are a lot of good fellows listed as candidates for the various county offices in Yamhill county and it really seems too bad to contemplate the fact that there are not enough places to go round.

Both the republican and democratic parties in Indiana have placed local option planks in their party platforms. If the good work goes on at this rate the wholesalers will need to make a second appeal to the ministers to assist them in their efforts to reform the saloon keepers.

Small tracts about Newberg have gone up in price until the hens are evidently beginning to see that the size of eggs must be materially increased in order to make good. L. M. Carey brought in an egg Wednesday that measures six and a half inches one way and eight inches the other way.

Since wife beating has been engaged in as a pastime in Oregon we can hardly blame the sisters when they give the men folks a little of the same kind of medicine, but we hardly expected them to begin on the preachers like those irate women did over at Salem a few days ago when they whipped Rev. W. N. Coffey, presiding elder of the Free Methodist church.

A great war has been made on the San Jose scale in the orchards about Newberg this season and it is to be hoped that the dope that has been used will prove to be more effectual than that which was used last season, which seemed to serve as an appetizer for the little pests without doing them any bodily injury. Like Josh Billings' book it appeared to have been "made to sell."

W. T. Macy, secretary of the county development league writes the Graphic that he is receiving many letters from parties asking for information regarding our county and that no advertising matter has been prepared

up to the present time. A small leaflet for immediate use is to be gotten out and anyone having photographs that could be used for cuts showing orchards, dairy ranches, manufacturing plants or anything that would be of interest to home seekers will confer a favor by forwarding same to Mr. Macy at McMinnville.

It is a pretty well established fact that almost anybody who has a little room to spare can by planting a few walnut trees of late varieties and taking proper care of them, supply themselves with plenty of English walnuts for home use. At least there are a number of trees at various points throughout the Willamette valley that are bearing nuts of the very best quality and every body who has the room should be encouraged to plant a few trees to at least supply the home with nuts. As for planting commercial orchards that is quite another proposition. Many are entering this new field of horticultural endeavor and doubtless many will succeed, but there will be many failures. The fact is it is a pretty safe proposition to make such a prediction with reference to the probable outcome, when people rush into any new and untried field of endeavor, for such a tide always carries with it a number who are lacking in the proper forethought to weigh the matter carefully beforehand and count the cost before plunging in. A man to succeed at anything must necessarily have a natural aptitude and liking for it, and the man who has no special liking for the planting and proper care and cultivation of trees has little business putting money into a walnut orchard or any other kind of an orchard. There are so many things to be considered in such an undertaking that the impatient man who will grow nervous in carrying out all the details and while waiting years for results, will almost surely play a losing game if he enters into it. It is worth nothing to this country to have men of this class going into the walnut business for they are sure to make a failure of it, but we are glad to note that many men throughout the valley are planting trees who will succeed. They are making a study of the business beforehand and are going in expecting to do their best, and they deserve encouragement for the public spirit and enterprise they are showing.
