Notes From Portland.

Recent investigations by United
 States government officials has
 proven that a great area in Har-
 ney county is improperly classed
 as "desert lands," since it will
 produce crops successfully with-
 out irrigation and is now doing
 so. As a consequence some
 50,000 acres are to be thrown
 open for homestead entry.

To celebrate the opening of the
 "Riparia Cut-off," which means
 ten hours between Portland and
 Lewiston-Clarkston instead of
 the thirty hours required by the
 former schedule, the people of
 Lewiston-Clarkston, are plan-
 ning a "Blossom Carnival" for
 May 1st, 2nd and 3rd. On the
 2nd a large party of Portland
 business men will be their guests,
 making the trip over the new
 line in a special train. This cut-
 off brings the entire Clearwater
 Basin into closest touch with
 Portland.

"I have never heard so many
 people express their intention of
 building, as this spring," re-
 marked one of Portland's oldest
 residents last week. Building,
 particularly in the residential
 sections of this city, was never
 so active, and people in a posi-
 tion to speak understandingly
 through frequent trips over the
 state, say that the same flatter-
 ing conditions prevail all over
 Oregon.

Sheridan, Oregon, had a meet-
 ing last Saturday, with the idea
 of organizing for the advertise-
 ment of their town and its vicini-
 ty. The business houses of the
 town were closed so that every-
 one might participate, and many
 farmers from the surrounding
 country were present. Quite a
 delegation came over from Mc-
 Minnville. A thousand dollars
 was raised for publicity, and to
 this fund the farmers were liber-
 al contributors. Sheridan will
 affiliate with the Oregon De-
 velopment League immediately.

A new feature introduced by
 the Portland Realty Board is a
 weekly excursion for its mem-
 bers, either to some suburban
 addition to Portland or to some
 point more distant, to thorough-
 ly familiarize them with the city,
 its environment and the state in
 general. Last Saturday they
 chartered two special cars and
 went to Salem a hundred strong
 over the new trolley line, to at-
 tend the Horse Show in the capi-

tal city. The excursionists were
 unanimous in pronouncing these
 interurban lines the most impor-
 tant factor in the development
 of any section. There is an as-
 surance that a line will be con-
 structed between Salem and
 Stayton very soon.

Paul Morton, the guest of the
 Portland Commercial Club a
 few days ago, returned to this
 city on the 3rd and announced
 that the Equitable Life Assur-
 ance Society, of which he is presi-
 dent, would make a loan of
 \$75,000 to the Y. M. C. A. here,
 that being the sum necessary to
 complete their handsome build-
 ing for which excavation is al-
 ready made. The Y. W. C. A.
 building is rapidly rising.
