Friday is primary election day and after that date the tratenity of handshakers will show a heavy falling off in numbers.

In a hunt for the "loaves and fishes" a minority party has everything to gain in a fusion proposition, but the majority party fellows are easy who bite at the bait.

The Mount Scott Tribune, H. Vincil Conway editor and proprietor, is the latest venture in the newspaper field. It is a neat little sheet and we hope to see it grow and prosper.

A number of towns are having very successful horse shows this spring. Why can't Newberg get in line and make a big day of it. We all like to see good horses and a good horse show creates an interest in breeding for better horses. What do you say?

The Washington County News issued a sixteen page Board of Trade edition last week in addition to the regular issue of the News. It is embellished with numerous halftones of prominent citizens, residences and business houses of Forest Grove, and withal makes a splendid advertising medium for that part of Washington county.

They know a good thing over at Salem when they see it. Recently they placed an order with a Portland firm for 5000 souvenir cards with a reprint of the picture of Chehalem valley taken from the top of Chehalem mountain for the souvenir edition of the Graphic in 1905. This is conceded to be the best valley scene ever taken in Oregon. On the cards furnished for Salem it is to be called "A Willamette valley scene."

Many voters make considerable sacrifice to get out and vote on election day who pay little or no attention to the primaries, seemingly caring little who is to be nominated. Such a course may satisfy those who only care to know that a man belongs to their party and who adopt the policy of "vot'er straight" on election day, regardless of the class of men whose names are to be found on the ticket, but those who are anxious to see that good and competent men are placed in responsible positions are usually to be found taking an active interest at primary elections.

Vote a Vigorous No.

The anti-saloon voters want to get their eyes open before election day comes round and keep a sharp lookout for the maneuvers of the enemy. The move of the saloon men this year is to get the people to vote to allow towns and cities the right to regulate the saloon business which would simply mean that in several counties that have been voted dry certain towns would immediately be made wet by action of the town council. Here are the arguments made against the adoption of the measure which seem very reasonable: "The foregoing proposed amendment is entirely superfluous; inasmuch as all cities and towns in the State of Oregon do now enjoy the fullest possible home-rule,

having absolute self-government—the right to make and amend their own charters and enact their own laws, subject only to the constitution and the general criminal laws of the State. This power was conferred by an amendment to the Constitution adopted in the election of 1906 and made effective by an act of the Legislature of 1907 'for carrying into effect amendment to section 2 article 11 of the Constitution, granting to cities, and towns the right to amend their charters.'

"While the ostensible purpose of the proposed amendment is to 'obtain practical home-rule for all cities and towns in Oregon,' it is very evident that the real purpose is to suspend the operation of the criminal laws of the State, as to certain practices, within the bounds of municipalities at their pleasure. If it does give to municipalities any power of home rule which they do not now possess, it is some power contrary to the Constitution of the State or in violation of the criminal laws.

"The effect of this amendment, if adopted, would be to divest sheriffs and district attorneys of the power to suppress pool-rooms and Sunday saloons, and give municipal authorities power to run as wide open as they desire. The Constitution now provides that city charters must be 'subject to the Constitution and criminal laws of the State.' The amendment proposed leaves out this important clause."

It is the purpose of the authors of the measure to confuse the voters at the polls and they will no doubt succeed in many instances unless there is a general awakening among the temperance people. No measure of more importance to those who oppose the saloon has been before the people for years and it is none too soon to begin to post people to see that they vote No on this amendment. If it should carry much valuable ground would be lost.


