



COLLEGE YEAR CLOSES.

Announcement of Exercises of Commencement Week.

Class work at the college was discontinued the first of the week and is being followed by three days of examinations which close tomorrow.

The first of the regular exercises of Commencement week will take place in the college chapel Saturday evening, June 13, when Rev. J. E. Blair, of the local Presbyterian Church, will deliver the annual address before the college literary societies, the public being cordially invited to attend. In connection there will also be a short program rendered by the members of the literary societies.

While it does not appear on the Commencement invitations, it is always understood that the baseball game between the college boys and the alumni is to be pulled off Saturday afternoon. Those who attend the game should take a vivid imagination along and they may be able to detect the hint of a resemblance between the contest put up and the great American game. No gate receipts, the only stipulation being that the fans must promise to leave the grounds after the game quietly and in good humor without violent demonstrations. This condition is insisted upon by the alumni, a number of whom do not carry life insurance.

Baccalaureate services will be held in the Friends church Sunday morning at eleven o'clock, the sermon to be preached by President W. Irving Kelsey. In the evening at eight the address to the Christian associations of the college will be delivered by Rev. F. C. Stanard whose many friends will be glad of this early opportunity to hear him on his return to Newberg.

On Monday evening the most popular exercises of the whole week are held in the college gymnasium. Just say "class day" and everybody understands—and goes early in hopes of getting a seat.

The graduating exercises of the academy will be held Tuesday afternoon at two o'clock in the Friends church.

At the same place in the evening takes place the public meeting of the Alumni Association. The principal address will be given by E. S. J. McAllister, of Portland. Good musical selections will be heard.

The Commencement exercises will take place in the Friends church Wednesday morning at ten o'clock. The address will be delivered by Dr. Benjamin Young, pastor of the First M. E. Church, Portland.

The program of the week will close with the Alumni banquet which will be given at the Hotel Imperial Wednesday evening in honor of the class of 1908.
