The result of the Salem cherry fair shows what Yamhill county can do in open competition when a capable man such as Mr. Lowndale gets busy and collects and arranges some of her fancy products. Now, how will it look after this success, for us to sit back at ease and not have a county exhibit at the coming state fair? We haven't had one for two or three years and have lost greatly in prestige thereby. There are few more effective means of advertising in our own state than is to be had in a good exhibit at the state fair—and especially if it is the winning one. We respectfully submit the matter for the consideration of the county court and suggest that an adequate appropriation for this purpose would be money wisely expended.

Our Portland correspondent says no meeting was ever called in Oregon which has attracted the universal enthusiasm that has been created by the Oregon Good Roads Conference, which is to be held in the Convention Hall, 6th floor, of the Portland Commercial Club on Tuesday, August 11th. An effort will be made to call the meeting to order promptly at 9:30 a. m. so that there may be a morning, an afternoon and an evening session. The railroads have made a rate of a fare and a third for the round trip for this occasion. Delegations representing every grange, the commercial bodies, and the different counties to be appointed by the county judges are already reporting that they will be present. Every editor in the state is a delegate at large, as is the mayor of every city, and every county commissioner. A program is being prepared, but every effort will be made to get rid of long winded speeches and get down to actual work that will produce results.

WHAT IS THE MATTER WITH OREGON?

Oregon's republican newspapers say that their state will give a large majority to Taft, and probably they are correct, but its politics has a speckled look to a good many persons. In the recent election its republican candidates for the legislature rolled up an aggregate plurality of 25,000 in the popular vote, yet, under its queer electoral system, this republican legislature is committed to the election of a democrat to the senate at Washington. As this democrat will vote with the democrats on all party issues it is hard to understand the republicanism of an electorate which would choose him in preference to a man who would be sure to vote with the republicans.

Politically, Oregon had a rather strange advent as a state. Although in latitude it is almost as far north as a state could be, it had a strong pro-slavery element at the outset. When the democracy split in the Charleston convention of 1860 on the sectional line, Oregon contributed one member of the Southern democratic ticket, Lane being the vice presidential nominee as a running mate with Breckinridge. Lincoln carried the state in that election, but he did it because Douglas, the Northern democratic candidate, took away enough votes from Breckinridge to allow the republicans to squeeze in. Oregon came to the republicans in the war election of 1864, because it had nowhere else to go, all its Breckinridge friends of four years earlier being out of the Union at that time. It gave its vote in 1868 to Seymour as against Grant, very nearly swung into the democratic column in 1880, and was in doubt for several days after the voting in 1896, but finally the vote showed that McKinley had it by a short lead.

Probably Oregon will support Taft this year. This looks like a republican year throughout the country, and while Bryan may carry some states in the West which he won in 1896, it is likely that Oregon will not be one of them. Chamberlain, however, whom it has just favored for the senate, carried the state twice for governor, although the republicans carried the members of Congress also. This choice of a democrat to the senate, where he will work and vote against the policies of President Taft, is a piece of guerrilla politics which will cast some discredit upon the political sanity of Oregon's electorate.—St. Louis Globe-Democrat.
