### ONCE UPON A TIME.

You no doubt have read the story of "The Wandering —." Well, once upon a time he came to town with a few goodsboxes filled with odds and ends made up from shelfworn stuff of ancient patterns and of uncertain "previous condition of servitude." This lot of old junk he dumped out onto counters, strung a lot up to the gaze of the gaping public in anticipation of the coming of a crop of suckers.

He asked for a half page space in one of the local papers, hoping in this way to reach the eyes of the unsuspecting public with a lot of dope about his "marked down" stuff, but he was refused space.

Other means for advertising were resorted to and the unthinking public came his way. Yes, there were the women who go about the streets asking for support by way of patronage at window sales, and entertainments for church revenue, and there were also the men who carry about at divers times, in season and out of season, subscription papers asking contributions for all kinds of things, all with the best of intentions and usually for worthy purposes.

But who do they go to? Who do they get the money from? How much do they get from the nomad who is here for a couple of weeks, and is away for other fields to work off more of his tag and stuff?

They pass up one side of the street and down the other, taking money from the pockets of the permanent business men who improve our streets and build our sidewalks, and who put up the money for our new church buildings and the schoolhouses, and tax themselves to educate our children. In fact they are the backbone of the community from every point of view when financial matters are to be considered. Then are not they entitled to the trade of the community as long as they are offering goods at a fair and reasonable profit, rather than the proprietor of a "cheap John" stall who rakes in the shekels and departs before the tax gatherer can get to him?

The Graphic gets its support largely from the permanent businessmen of Newberg, though a few of them are perfectly willing to let this shop defend their interests without reciprocating to any appreciable extent, and we don't care to give space to the transient who contributes nothing to Newberg and its interests. Of course others may patronize the nomad if they like, but in order to be consistent they should go to the same source for support for their side interests.

### FALL SPRAYING

Orchardists are beginning to become cognizant of the fact that the San Jose scale is out for business and that he is here to stay unless he is put out of business by the application of dope in sufficient quantities to turn his stomach very effectually. In many instances those who have endeavored to spray in the spring according to directions, have been compelled to delay the work on account of unfavorable weather until the buds have started, and consequently spray material of weaker solutions were used and the results have been unsatisfactory. Fall spraying is being recommended and we hope to see some of the men who have outfits for spraying for others getting busy.

W. G. Allen says that about Eugene they have been spraying for the scale with concentrated lye with the best results yet attained.

The Country Gentleman says: "It will not do to say the preventatives used and which have proven effective heretofore, were of no avail whatever. To admit that would be to admit defeat in our warfare. The condition is not discouraging to the orchardist who will examine the situation and learn the lesson that it is impossible by spring spraying to control the scale in an orchard in a territory within which it is generally distributed. It will be necessary to spray in the fall also, and it is possible that fall may prove the right time for this work. The scale is less resistant in the fall than in the spring. There will be found many young crawling larvae and many which have recently set; the incrustation will be found to be soft, easily penetrated by the caustic solution used for their extermination."

"It, however, the fall spraying is not entirely effective, another opportunity is afforded before the breeding season of the scale begins by spraying in the spring. There have been many developments in both methods of spraying and materials. The lime, sulphur and salt wash, both boiled and unboiled, has proved most generally effective. I have seen excellent results from crude petroleum, and some very disastrous ones.

### FAILURE TO REGISTER

Preceding every election, regardless of all the urging of the country press, there are hundreds of voters who fail to register and when election day comes they are anxious to vote and are put to much trouble in doing so. Registration for the November election closed Tuesday, yet the Register is in receipt of a letter from a Pleasant Hill reader who says there are four legal voters at his place, all Tait men, who failed to register and want to know if they are too late to get on the books. They are, and the only way they can vote is to get six freeholders and sign Blank A. Nothing can prevent their voting for president if they have been long enough in the state.—Eugene Register.

This appeared before the election and the only reason for its publication now is to call the question of this feature of our registration law to our readers. It appears to the Graphic very much like boys play to have a law on our statute books requiring voters to register, and in the same act to make provision for the lazy, indifferent voter who neglects to comply with the law. We should like to see the law amended so that none whose names are not found on the books, except those who are able to certify to the election board that they were prevented from registering by being absent from home, should be allowed to vote. Our policy would be to either cut out the registration law entirely or make it effective. The loss to the state of the vote of the fellow who is too indifferent to register would not be a very serious one.

A gentleman in town who has been accustomed to hearing great platform orators, in speaking of the different numbers that have been booked for the Newberg Lyceum course said that he would pay a dollar willingly to hear Russell H. Conwell. originating in the Spokane County Horticultural Society, the apple show to be held in Spokane, December 7 to 12 has become international in scope. Advances were received the past week that Japan, England, Germany and Norway will all have national displays at the Spokane show. British Columbia and other Canadian provinces have already reserved space for approximately 200 exhibits, and the indications are that they will double this number. In all, the entries received up to the first of November aggregate 650.
