We notice that a number of our exchanges are running a big advertisement, sent out by a San Francisco company, exploiting the "Kern Associated Oil Company" and offering a "limited number of shares for sale." The same advertisement was offered to the Graphic at regular rates but it was declined. The company is no doubt good for its obligations but our observation has been that not one time in a hundred does the small investor in these outside oil and mining propositions ever get one penny back in return for what he puts in, and consequently we don't care to be the means of placing such propositions before our readers. They always offer big returns and put it in a way that looks like a sure thing to the inexperienced and to people of small means who can't afford to lose, but this is the class that is usually caught by these flaming advertisements and this is the unfortunate feature of it. If people who have money that they can spare want to invest in a proposition of this kind, that is their lookout, but as a rule you will notice that people of this class carefully investigate before they put their money into such a proposition. Money kept at home and put into the legitimate channels of trade may appear to be rather "slow" when compared with the glittering offers made for investment in a "limited" number of shares of oil stock, but in nearly every instance it will cause less loss of sleep and fewer anxious days of waiting than will an investment in the oily proposition that comes to you through the big newspaper advertisement or the handsomely printed two color circular.

The time is certainly at hand when the streets in Newberg should be properly designated by posting the names at the street corners and the houses should all be numbered. It is difficult to direct a stranger to any particular residence in town and the electric light people say that when an order is left at the office for work it is often almost impossible to locate the party afterward if he is a stranger, unless some notation is made along with the name, saying he lives next door to some well known citizen or in the vicinity of some particular point in town. The population of Newberg has reached a point in numbers that makes this step necessary if we propose to keep in line with all the live, up to date towns in the country, and we believe the city council should lose no time in taking the matter up and pushing it. The people want it done and the council should attend to it at once.

In this issue will be found a tribute to the memory of Mr. Wickersham who spent a month or more in Newberg this fall and who died soon after leaving here. He was known only to a few of the readers of the Graphic but since we hear of so much corruption these days among men who hold responsible positions, it is indeed refreshing to read of one, who, through a long life of usefulness in serving the public, left no dark spots to mar the memory of a well spent life, hence this tribute written by a near friend.

There is no such a personage as a non-partisan in politics, except for the getting of votes, and the office seeker who undertakes to ride the so-called non-partisan horse earns the contempt of all honest people. None but simpletons will swallow his dope.

Those having public entertainments in charge in Newberg are training the people to come late by delaying the beginning of the performances. If an entertainment is billed to begin at eight o'clock what is the good of getting into the habit of waiting from a quarter to half an hour after the time to begin? As long as this custom prevails the people will go straggling in late as they will have reason to expect a delayed beginning, but if they once learn to expect promptness they will be on time. A revival of the habit of promptness at our public gatherings will be appreciated by a whole lot of people who are getting weary of being compelled to wait for stragglers.

Miles Overholt, who held down the lid on the Jacksonville Post for a season, but who has been devoting his time to the publication of the Tanglefoot Magazine during the past eight months, has leased the Dayton Optimist plant of Mr. Barry. He will publish the Optimist and will also get out his magazine from the same office. Mr. Overholt said at one time that if he was ever again found located in a printshop in a country town he wanted somebody to come around and kick him out of the county, or words to that effect, but he was excusable. He had no knowledge of the small towns in Yamhill county at that immature age. He is older now. We forgive him and welcome him to the newspaper field in the best county in the best state in the Union.
