ACRES OF DIAMONDS.

Remember that Russell H. Conwell is booked for one of the numbers in the Star Lyceum course and also take note of the fact that while it is customary to charge a dollar to hear Conwell alone the price of a season ticket for the course is only \$1.50.

Rev. Albert H. Smith in his new book on Conwell's work says:

"Russell H. Conwell, the lecturer, is the most sought after of any man on the lecture platform today. Of his thirty lectures, one, 'Acres of Diamonds,' has been delivered 2600 times in twenty-nine years. His lecture engagements average two hundred nights a year, and from his lecture fees he has contributed toward the education of poor students more than half a million dollars.

"Russell H. Conwell the philanthropist, is founder and president of a university of four thousand students, which in addition to a large day department, adapts itself to the needs of the working people, who are too busy and too poor to attend Harvard, Yale or Princeton, but who receive at Temple University, during their evenings, and in times of cessation from customary toil, inspiration and instruction by which thousands have been enabled to earn better living, and hundreds to climb to positions of power and influence in the learned professions. He also has a largelist of students supported by him in Eastern colleges.

"He is founder and promoter of the Samaritan Hospital, healing twelve hundred people a month. In this hospital the poor can have the advantage of the best medical skill, and receive the attention of trained nurses, without money and without price, a Christian hospital where the sick are healed for Jesus, sake.

"He is founder of an orphanage which cares for the little ones of fireman or policeman who lays down his life to save his neighbor's life or property."

In only three other cities in Oregon, Astoria, Portland and Eugene, will Conwell speak in his hurried tour of the Coast this season. He will give his most popular lecture "Acres of Diamonds" and none can afford to miss hearing him. Get a season ticket for the course.

The period a town must pass through when it is too big to be satisfied with the conveniences of a small country town, and yet hardly large enough and rich enough to take on all that a fair sized city demands, is about as embarrassing as the situation every overgrown boy finds himself in, when the sound of his voice indicates that period of his existence previous to his final step toward young manhood, known as the "gosing" stage. The boy at this age feels that the whole world is looking at him and demanding of him more than he can deliver without serious embarrassment, and so it is with the overgrown town. Many things are demanded in the way of necessary improvements to insure proper sanitary conditions and to give the people proper conveniences, but the financial end is the problem that puzzles the brain of the property owners. The question of a sewer system is probably one of the most difficult to solve as it is one of the improvements that must come up for consideration sooner or later, and it means an expenditure of a large sum of money. For the past three or four years some sewer talk has been indulged in here at home and the

matter will come up at the city election the first of the year in the form of an amendment to the city charter, paving the way for initiative work for a sewersystem for Newberg. Mention is here made of it in order that property owners may have it in mind and take the proposition under advisement.

There is a movement on foot in different counties in the state to petition the members of the legislature who committed themselves to the Statement No. 1 proposition, to refuse to support Chamberlain for United States Senator on the ground that many democrats committed fraud in registering as republicans prior to the holding of the primary election, and also on account of the fact that the state is overwhelmingly republican, as was shown by the majority rolled up for Taft. This reminds us that a Newberg citizen who takes no active part in politics remarked to the writer several weeks ago that he would be glad to sign a petition asking the members of the legislature to elect some man other than Chamberlain for senator and we think his reasons for suggesting such a course were even better than those suggested above. He took the ground that any man who had such a craven appetite for drink that he had lost all control of himself and at various times had disgraced himself and the state of Oregon by appearing in public places in such a state of intoxication that he had to be held up by two or more of his friends, was very poor timber to send to Washington to represent Oregon in the senate. Was this Newberg man right or was he wrong?

The people of Newberg have ample opportunity for attending cheap shows every week in the year, but among the many entertainments that are offered there are comparatively few that are really high class. The twenty business men who are backing the Star Lyceum course believe they are offering three numbers that will be worth much more than the price asked for season tickets and they hope the public will respond with liberal patronage. If actual expenses are met this season it will give encouragement for even a stronger course another season.
