Obituary.

Lena Elsie Imus was born near
Dundee, Oregon, Oct. 19, 1883,
and died Dec. 19, 1908. Most
of life her has been spent at Dun-
dee, where she was loved and re-
spected by all. Three years ago
she took a business course at the
Portland Business College, but
two years ago she was called
home during the illness and death
of her father to assist in the post
office, and has since been assist-
ant postmaster for her mother.
Becoming despondent and think-
ing she had nothing to live for,
she took carbolic acid last Thurs-
day evening. She was uncon-
scious for ten hours, then became
conscious for twenty-four hours
before she died. She told her
mother several times that she
had prayed to God and that all
was well with her—her peace was
made with her Heavenly Father
and she longed to be at rest. She
leaves a mother, two brothers
and three sisters to mourn the
loss of a loving daughter and sis-
ter.

Mary E. Way was born in Ke-
okuk county, Iowa, November
28, 1843 and was married to
Zimri Mendenhall, December 13,
1860. Died at her home near
Champoeg, December 20, 1908,
aged sixty-five years, her hus-
band having died some years ago.
To them were born twelve chil-
dren, seven girls and five boys,
eight of whom are living. Both
were members of the Friends
church and lived consistent Chris-
tian lives.

The funeral services were con-
ducted at the home on Tuesday
afternoon by Rev. A. J. Weaver,
pastor of Friends church, New-
berg.

Rev. John Branch, a retired
Presbyterian minister, a veteran
of the Civil war, having served
as chaplain and who was a mem-
ber of the G. A. R. post at Dayton,
died in the hospital at the soldiers
home at Roseburg December 16.
He leaves a wife, two sons and
two daughters to mourn his loss
but he has gone to his reward.
