The City Election.

A very fair sized crowd turned out to the caucus held on last Saturday night, although a goodly number preferred the Multnomah-P. C. basketball game instead, while still more hugged hot stoves at home rather than face the snow storm that was raging on that evening.

Mayor Harrold wielded the big stick while Recorder Nelson kept tab on the proceedings with paper and pencil. On motion it was decided to put up two men for each office and accordingly R. W. Harrold and Jesse Edwards were nominated for mayor, J. C. Colcord and N. C. Christenson for treasurer, but the nomination of a candidate for recorder was tossed in the direction of the present incumbent, W. W. Nelson without giving him a running mate.

In the First ward two councilmen were to be elected and L. S. Otis was nominated for the two year term and J. J. Hagmann for the one year term, only one for each term being named.

W. S. Stull and J. H. Wilson were named for the Second ward though the latter declined to make the race and F. A. Elliott was put up and voted for on election day.

In the Third ward G. W. James and J. E. Brunton were placed in nomination.

The chairman called on Attorney Clarence Butt to make some statements and explanations regarding the proposed changes in the city charter, in which was included the sewer proposition, which he did at the close of the caucus proceedings. J. C. Hodson and J. B. Rowell spoke in opposition to the charter amendment at the present time, while Jesse Edwards spoke in favor of it. On election day it was voted down by the very decisive majority of 225 to 84, though this could not be said to voice the sentiment of the people on the sewer question, for many voted no on account of their opposition to having all the measures couched in one.

The election was held on Monday and it "passed off quietly." In fact the weather conditions were such that it would have been difficult for an enthusiastic patriot to have become hot under the collar if he had tried.

In the First ward the stay-at-home policy was pursued and only 65 votes were cast. Second ward cast 142 and Third ward 143, making a total of 350, which was a light vote.
