High School Debate.

Last Friday evening a debate
was held in Duncan's Hall be-
tween two teams representing
the Newberg and Yamhill High
Schools. The debate was held
under the auspices of the Oregon
High School Debating League,
which includes forty or more high
schools of the state.

The Yamhill High School was
represented by the following
team: Forest Williams, leader,
Mae Stewart and Nona Goodrich.
The debaters from the Newberg
High school were: Vernon Mot-
schenbacher, leader, Kathryn
Bryan, and Dale Trew. The
question debated was: "Re-
solved, that The Federal Govern-
ment should own and operate
the railroads." Newberg sup-
ported the negative.

The judges were Judge M. C.
George of Portland, Prof. A. L.
Briggs of Monmouth, and Prof.
W. J. Reagan of Pacific College.
The decision was unanimous in
favor of the Newberg team.

Judge George in announcing the
decision praised the debaters very
highly. He stated that he had
officiated as a judge in many
high school, college and universi-
ty debates, but had never at-
tended one wherein he was more
greatly interested in the argu-
ments presented than in the de-
bate of the evening.

By winning this first prelimi-
nary debate, the local team is
now in line for winning the
championship of this district and
of the state. Their next debate
will be against the Astoria High
High School team. The debate
will probably be held at Astoria
in about three weeks. The team
would prefer to debate in this
city, but on account of the great
expense of bringing the Astoria
team to this city, it was thought

best to let Astoria manage the
financial part and hold the de-
bate there.

On account of the extremely cold
weather, and the reception held
by the Commercial Club, there
were very few people out to hear
the debate, and as a result the
student body of the High School
lack about \$20. of paying the
necessary expenses. Prof. W. A.
Wiest, principal of the Yamhill
school, presided.

The musical numbers on the
program were all exceptionally
well rendered. The vocal solos by
Misses Gorman and Bixby and
the ladies quartette, in which
Misses Gregory, Miller, Stannard
and Moffit participated, were re-
peatedly encored.

High School Items

The two literary societies have
had a great deal of trouble in ar-
ranging for the oratorical con-
test which will be some time in
February, but we hope that the
contestants now chosen will be
able to carry the work through
and have as good a contest as
our declamatory.

On account of the scarcity of
snow in the Willamette Valley,
all rooms sending in petitions
were excused at 2:30 Thursday
afternoon to go coasting. Some
of the teachers accompanied
their rooms.

Mr. Kletzer and some of the
boys have made a bobsled large
enough to hold fourteen which

Mr. Kletzer as steersman, for he
is very skillful and has had some
practice while in Alaska.

The High School was well
pleased with the unanimous de-
cision of the judges at the debate
Friday night.

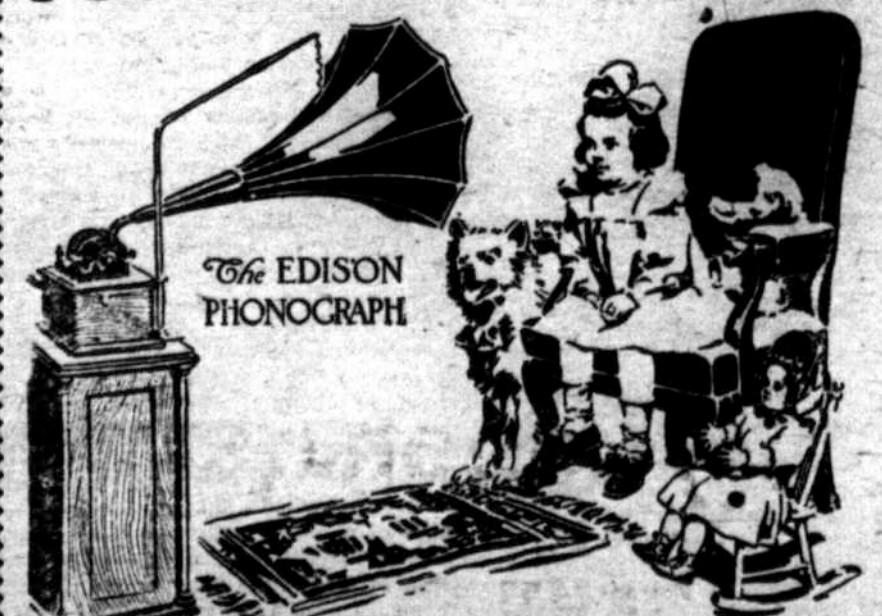
