A constant reader of the Graphic who has traveled all over the country writes to say, "I want to commend three things in your editorial page: Prices of realty, numbering of streets, street corner remarks concerning ministers. The numbering of houses and the naming of streets is a matter neglected in our larger cities. The western cities that rank poorest in this regard are as follows: TACOMA, SEATTLE, SPOKANE, ST. PAUL, CHICAGO in order named. It is an outrage that cities in a progressive age should neglect the naming of streets or rather the placing of names on streets so that civilized human beings who are strangers in a place can see them. TACOMA ranks first and SEATTLE second in this respect. One can walk for an hour through Tacoma and never see a street name. It is the practice, though, for towns to place the name of a street up but once, and when that comes down or is torn down, future generations may hunt in vain. When the booze business vanishes and policemen disappear there will be no one to ask."

While we have had a pretty stiff winter for the Willamette valley the doctors have not been kept very busy.

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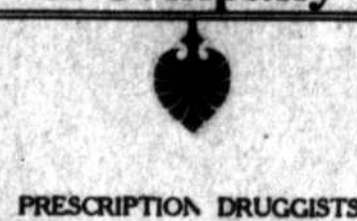
