Obituary.

Early Saturday morning Feb. 20, 1909 the messenger of death entered our community and took from our midst one of our highly esteemed citizens, and from a sorrowing family a beloved husband and father, when Jacob L. Jones departed this life.

The deceased was born at Cadiz, Harrison county, Ohio, April 20, 1850, and went with his parents to Iowa when four years of age. With the exception of ten years spent in Nebraska, he lived in Iowa until he came west last year.

In 1872 Mr. Jones was married to Miss Barbara Gutschall to whom were born four children. In 1880 his first wife died, and in 1884 he was united in marriage with Miss Anna M. Jones, who survives him.

In 1890 Mr. Jones professed conversion and entered the fellowship of the Baptist church of Hartington, Nebraska. On coming to Newberg he with his wife and three children united with the Baptist church of this place, and was an honored and beloved member at the time of his death.

Mr. Jones was for many years a prosperous farmer of Madison county, Iowa, and has a large acquaintance throughout the county. His many friends in the old home state will regret his untimely death.

The deceased had been suffering from disease of the heart for several months and while friends had been apprehensive about his condition it was thought that the worst was over, and that he was on the road to recovery. On the evening before his death his daughter and her husband, Mr. and Mrs. L. G. Kinch, arrived from Nebraska, and were glad to find their father so much improved. He ate a hearty supper and visited until late in the evening, and at ten o'clock, when the family retired, protested that he wasn't tired. He slept naturally until 2 o'clock A.M. when his heavy breathing awakened his wife who spoke to him, but receiving no reply, she aroused the family, but life had departed before help could be summoned.

The funeral services were held in the Baptist church Sunday afternoon, conducted by the pastor, Rev. F. C. Stamard, and were attended by a large company of sympathizing friends. The remains were laid to rest in the Roselawn cemetery.

The deceased leaves a widow and twelve children, seven of whom are with their mother. The children from the first marriage are Mrs. Ida Jones of Idaho, Mrs. Letha Kinch of Neb., Mrs. Rose William of S. D. and George Jones of S. Dakota. The children of the last union are Mrs. Fay McDonald of Iowa, J. Earl, Carl O. Zelma Gladys, Vera Wallace and Luene.

The sorrowing relatives have the deepest sympathy of a large circle of friends in this place. They have been here but a short time, but have won their way into our hearts and command the highest respect.
