John I. The deceased was a modest and unassuming man, one of the few remaining pioneers of Chehalem valley, and a man who was held in good esteem by his neighbors. The funeral will probably be held on Saturday afternoon, though an answer to a telegram to a son living in Iowa is awaited.

Jesse Edwards has platted a thirty acre tract laying south of Ninth street, into small tracts, ranging from half an acre to three acres which he will put on the market. The location is desirable and the property will no doubt meet with ready sale.

County Commissioners, Booth and Cummins, with a surveying crew, came down from the county seat Tuesday to make final adjustment of a road matter out at Rex. A strip of land has been purchased of N. L. Wiley by the county, in order to straighten the wagon road and avoid two railroad crossings, both of which are dangerous.
