



King-Woodward Wedding.

Using the peculiarly impressive Friends ceremony, Miss Bernice Woodward was married to Mr. Wm. A. King, Wednesday evening, May 19, at eight o'clock, at the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. E. H. Woodward on North River street. As the strains of Mendelssohn's "Spring Song," played in the hall by the Misses Mabelle Gardner and Doris Gregory and Mr. Alexander Hull on piano, violin and cello, respectively, were heard, the bridal couple, preceded by Rev. A. J. Weaver, pastor of the Friends church, descended the stairway and entering the parlor, took position before the bay windows, where in an arch of exquisite maiden hair fern and bridal wreath, the young people were made husband and wife, the ceremony being accompanied by the subdued music from the hall-way.

The bride was gowned in cream messaline over taffeta and carried a bouquet of bride roses and orange blossoms, also wearing a spray of the latter in her hair. The orange was sent for the occasion by relatives from the South, Mr. and Mrs. L. J. Stanley, of Whittier, with the written admonition, "What the orange blossoms of Sunny California join together, let no rains of Oregon put asunder."

Following the congratulations, the guests were led to the dining room where they were served with refreshments by Mrs. W. S. Parker and Miss Ione Hill, assisted by Miss Lenora Parker and Miss Myrtle Gause. The decorations in this room consisted of smilax and pink carnations. The living room and hall were decorated with dogwood blossoms and vine maple. The parlor was made beautiful with a wealth of delicate maiden hair ferns and festoons of asparagus fern, flavored with the aroma of the orange blossoms.

At ten o'clock the guests gathered outside on the lighted lawn and gave Mr. and Mrs. King a merry good bye as they left in an automobile of a Portland relative, Mr. Jeffery, for the city, accompanied by Miss Jeffery and Miss O'Connor, also of Portland. County W. C. T. U. Institute.

The Yamhill County W. C. T. U. Institute which was held in the Baptist church of Amity, May 13-14 was a success from first to last.

The present organization at Amity has only been in existence since last June. They organized or reorganized at that time with only nine members. At the opening of the institute they had twenty-nine members and three new members were added during the institute. Thus we see the organization is in a growing stage and not in its dotage.

The two resident pastors of Amity wear the white ribbon and attended every session. They heartily support the local union. Every three months they have a gospel temperance meeting in one of the churches.

The foregoing conditions afforded a very pleasant atmosphere in which to hold the County Institute.

The county presiding officer, Miss Edith Minchin has the work well in hand and with the co-operation of the local union and it's efficient president the details of the institute seem to have all been well planned.

Mrs. Neal B. Inman of Portland a W. C. T. U. worker of wide experience (having been County Pres. of Umitilla County, State President of Idaho and a worker in Oklahoma at the time of the successful campaign for

prohibition) was present throughout the institute. She helped, not only by her words but her sweet and modest manner and the disclosure of her sincere trust and faith in our Heavenly Father were a benediction.

The program was well carried out, some of the numbers being as follows: Mr. Lynn, a theological student of McMinnville College gave a good address on Purity. Mrs. Webber of Newberg argued for woman's suffrage. Mrs. Inman and Rev. Stockton spoke upon the subject, "Prohibition in 1910." Rev. Stockton gave figures from a recent bulletin of the agricultural Department in Washington in which J. H. Lewis, state engineer made a report on the water-power possibilities of the Oregon rivers. This power, if utilized might yield an immense annual revenue. The speaker suggested we need not fear to give up the revenue from the liquor traffic so long as we have the possibilities of such revenue from pure water. He fittingly suggested that Oregon might be a pure water state in all respects.

The Bible teaching in regard to systematic and proportionate giving were considered by Mrs. Kulper, of Dayton, and Mrs. Inman. There was a strong belief that if this teaching were heeded, the question of finances in all of our christian activities would be solved.

Plans for conducting successful unions were considered by Mrs. De Vore, of Dayton, and Mrs. Scott of Newberg.

Mrs. Mary Royce, of Newberg, prepared a paper, which was read, upon the subject, medal contests for "Educating Public Sentiment."

The popular meeting of the institute was Thursday night when a medal contest was held. The church was well filled, and five matrons appeared as contestants for the silver medal. Their selections were faithfully rendered. Mrs. Perkins, of Dayton, who recited "How Mrs. Hennessey Saved Her Boy" was the winner. The program of the evening was interspersed by songs, drills and recitations given by the young people and children of the town, all of which made a very entertaining occasion.

Resolutions were passed by the institute in regard to the importance of organizing Loyal Temperance Legions, of holding medal contests, and of increasing our diligence in prayers and service to obtain prohibition for Oregon in 1910.

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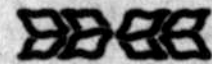
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
