**On Press Work.**

The power of the press is un-  
limited. It furnishes our intel-  
lectual food. Words fail to ex-  
press the eagerness with which  
the morning and evening papers  
are waited for. In all our foreign  
and illiterate countrys the press  
is the first requisite to arrest  
darkness, and to shed a glimmer  
of light.  
It is the fore-runner of progress  
of art and sciences, of morality  
and religion. A printed leaflet,  
only a text, picked up and read,  
has changed a life of slavery to  
one of freedom.  
A book opens the heart and in-  
spires the soul with the experi-  
ences, inspirations and deeds of  
all the countless dead. The use  
of the press has become necessary  
to an intelligent existence.  
Could we, would we like to do  
without our papers which pro-  
claim world-wide the news of joy  
or sorrow, of war or peace, of  
sin or righteousness from all over

**Very Large Bridge.**

A great bridge is to be con-  
structed across Hell Gate, New  
York, which will serve to connect  
the system of the New Haven  
Railroad company with that of  
the Pennsylvania Railroad  
company on Long Island. The  
bridge, including its steel  
approaches, will be about a mile  
and a half in length, with a  
central span above Hell Gate  
1,000 feet in length, having 135  
feet headway above the water.  
It will be a braced arched  
structure, the total height of the  
arch above the suspended road-  
way being 110 feet. The crown  
of the arch will be 277 feet above  
the water. The structure will  
provide four railroad tracks,  
capable of carrying the heaviest  
load of locomotives and freight  
trains upon all four tracks at the  
same time. This will be the  
heaviest span, per foot of its  
length, of any of the existing  
long-span bridges of the world.
