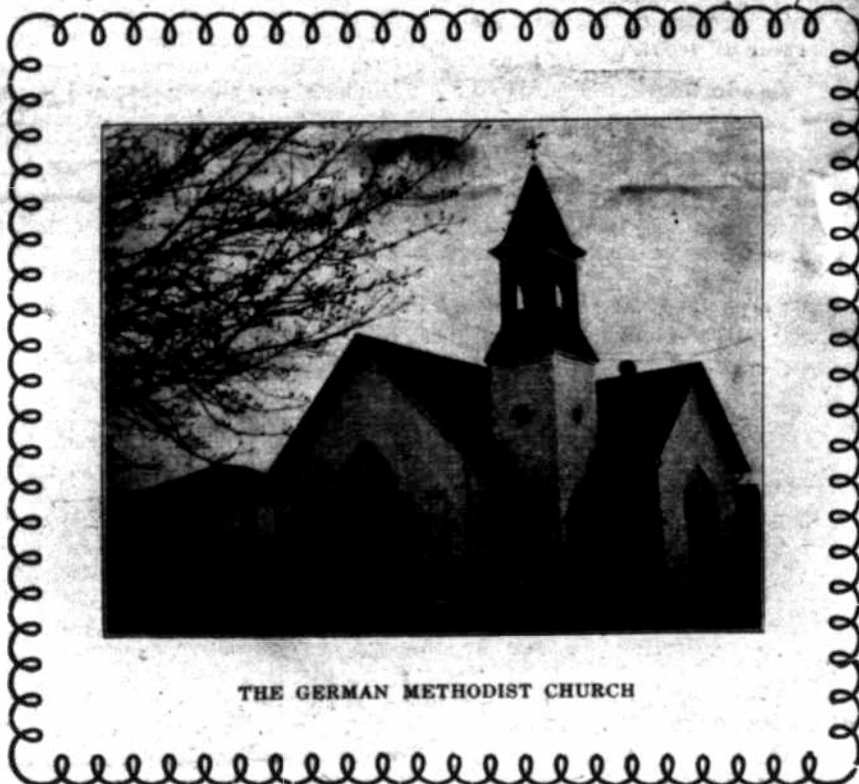
Children's Day at Christian Church.

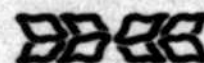
