The Gordons in Paris.

Have bought a car load of mares, and good ones I think. I shall buy a two year old horse yet and then go to Belgium and buy a mare for a Mr. Messenger, of Portland. We will go from here to London in a day or two and be there for the big horse show June 5, then go to Belgium for their horse show. Then we will go to Glasgow, Scotland to spend some time.

We will ship from Havre, France on the steamer Minneapolis August 7 and reach Newberg the last of August. We rode in an auto 300 miles to buy the mares. The roads all over France are as smooth as your cement walks. We are well and as we have gotten the horses bought we will devote more time to taking in places of interest.

This is a great city. There is a great deal of wealth and much poverty. We see fine teams of horses hauling loads and we also see women hitched along with a dog, hauling a great cart loaded heavy. They are very cruel to their horses. They shoe them smooth to save the streets, then they load very heavy, and they can hardly keep their feet, so it makes it very hard.

We found good mares hard to buy as there are a great many buyers here from America and prices have gone up very much in the past few months, but we went to the best breeders and I think as good a car load of horses has never gone to Oregon as ours will be. Our mares are mostly two year olds, five older. They are grays and blacks, with one chestnut two year old that weighs 1600 pounds.
